Bill Thompson told the club that he and Colette recently attended a local event in their Model **A**, and planned to watch from the sidelines. An official with the event came up to him and asked him what he was doing on the side and Bill answered that they were going to watch.

"Absolutely not!" he told Bill. "You take your car up the street and get it registered so you can participate." Great job, Bill and Colette for representing our club.

The next item on the agenda was the presentation of awards by Theon Laney. Theon first mentioned that we have a lot of members who are working on their 13+ Award, which is presented to those members who drive their Model A's (or ride in someone else's car) for 12 straight months, including driving/riding the car to at least one club activity or meeting. (Thus 12+1=13+) There followed a short discussion about when those 12 months started and ended each year, which will need to be resolved at the next board meeting.

Theon mentioned that he knows of at least 8 members who have already earned their Lucky 7 Award, which is presented to members who drive their car to at least 7 club activities (NOT including regular club meetings). Those awards will be presented in the future as the award patches are produced.

Next came the coveted Bent Rod Award which is presented to members who have car problems for which they are the source of the problem. This month, the nominations were limited to the following:

- <u>Clyde Munson</u> who struggled with an electrical problem only to discover

that the car's battery had been charged BACKWARDS, so that the polarity of the battery posts was wrong.

- Then he was late and had to drive in the dark on the I-15 Freeway.






A quick announcement was made for the club members to mark their calendars for this year's Annual Christmas Party, which has been scheduled for Saturday, December 6th in the Clyde Building.

Howard also reminded the club members about the 3-Day Vernal/NE Utah/ Wyoming Tour next month. It is discussed in this newsletter as well.



Before concluding the meeting, Bob Todd mentioned that he had a box of Model A parts that are available for the club members to examine at the end of the meeting.

A Note on Authenticity


Area 17 of the Restoration Guidelines and Judging Standards addresses the tools that came with each Model A. This is an area you can pursue without changing anything on your car. Page 17-10 says, "Starting in January 1928, an instruction book was provided for every vehicle sold. The instruction book was changed as major changes were incorporated..." There were actually 13 different instruction books produced for the Model A.

BUYER BEWARE: This is an area where you need to make sure you get the correct book for your car. There have been many reprints of the instruction book. In fact, you can buy a reprint from the MAFCA

website. The first time I saw one of these books, I offered to buy it. Come to find out, it was a MAFCA reproduction and thus had no authenticity value in my toolkit.

The Standards say that instruction books have glossy pages. Also, the Ford Script in the oval on the cover was the same size as the one on the inside front page. Be sure to check the copyright page to ensure it's not a MAFCA reproduction.

Below is the Instruction Books chart from page 17-10 of the Standards which shows the usage dates for each version of the Instruction Book (see figure below). The chart will help you identify the major change in each version so you can be sure it will match your car.




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For example, if you have a late 1931 Model A with the indented firewall and the associated Side Bowl Carburetor, then you need the second book printed in 1931. You'll see this feature described if you look in the book where it shows the side bowl carburetor (see figure below). (Now, upon further inspection, my 1931 Instruction Book looks to have different size scripts and is not printed on glossy paper. Perhaps, I need to keep looking.

Recipe of the Month

Magic (Malt-O-Meal) Muffins

A Family Favorite Since 1919

Malt-O-Meal Company was founded in 1919 as the Campbell Cereal Company by John Campbell, a miller in Owatonna, Minnesota. He invented a combination of farina wheat and malted barley hot breakfast cereal he called Malt-O-Meal. Campbell intended to compete with Cream of Wheat. The cereal can also be used to make a batter that makes delicious muffins. Here is the

recipe:

Ingredients:

1-1/4 cups of all-purpose flour

3/4 cups of Malt-O-Meal hot cereal, dry

½ cup of sugar

3/4 cup of milk

½ cup vegetable oil

1 egg

1 tablespoon baking powder

½ teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon vanilla (optional)

Directions:

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F.

Combine all ingredients in large mixing bowl.

Stir together until all ingredients are moistened.

Pour batter into greased or paper-lined muffin pan, ³/₄ full each.

Bake 18 to 20 minutes or until center is firm to the touch.


Serve hot, with butter, honey, jam or jelly.

Following the initial five Model A body styles introduced in December 1927, the Fordor Sedan (60-A) became available in May 1928. This vehicle was a four-door, two-window sedan with a brown artificial leather-covered roof, manufactured by Briggs. Later, in 1929, the Briggs-manufactured black artificial leather top (60-B) and black steel top (60-C) Fordor Sedan models were added. In July 1929, Briggs also produced a new two-window Model A Fordor Sedan (170-A), using more steel in the structural body parts.

ford promoted the Model A Fordor Sedan in 1928 and 1929 using 33 different magazine ad variations. All of the 1928 magazines ads featured Fordor Sedans with Seal Brown artificial leather top treatments (60-A). In 1929, most of the ads showed cars with black artificial leather covered roofs (60-B). However, the last was ads produced in 1929 featured Fordor Sedans with black painted steel roofs (60-C).



From the Scrapbook of the late Gwen Gerber Dockstader 1932 – 2022



Any time you open a magazine, you'll be bombarded by ads for beauty products. In addition, an 'expert' will tell you how to take care of your health. Nothing changes, as this was also the case in the Model A era. However, some of the suggestions that we see in the era magazines would be suspect now. It's always fascinating to examine what was taking place during those earlier years. Following are some examples, taken from a single issue of a 1930 magazine.

General beauty and health tips:

There were numerous articles and advertisements focusing on the internal workings of the body. It was stated that lasting loveliness could not be achieved unless you kept internally clean. Products such as Sal Hepatica, Olive Tablets, fresh yeast and Postum would work towards that goal.



Some Women Always Attract The women you most admire, and perhaps

The women you most admire, and perhaps envy, prize their beauty and guard it. Their lustrous eyes and clear skin are the result of daily care. Above all else, these women keep their blood free of the poisons of constipation. Thousands of such women find Dr. Edwards Olive Tablets a matchless corrective. Made of pure vegetable ingredients. Know them by their olive color. They are a safe substitute for dangerous calomel. Not habit-forming. All druggists, 15c, 30c and 60c.

If that doesn't fix you up, try *Dr Edwards Olive Tablets*. The ad states that they will keep your blood free of the poisons of constipation and the results will be lustrous eyes and clear skin.





If all else fails, try drinking **Postum**. This product made from roasted whole wheat and bran should be drunk instead of caffeinated beverages. Try it hot or cold and you can even add a dollop of whipped cream to the top, or beaten into the drink. Thousands of people are said to have claimed that 'they feel like a different person' after consuming Postum for thirty days.

A tip – smoke *Old Gold Cigarettes* and you won't be left with any irritation to your throat. They are made of better tobacco and are endowed by nature with a new taste-thrill. The first carload reached the west coast on October 24, 1926.







Ponds Extract Company sold 4 skin preparations to ensure that your skin would be dazzling fine and fair. They say that Pond's Cold Cream is the lightest and most exquisite obtainable, for immaculate cleansing several times a day. Then, to give you the alabaster look of utter daintiness, use Pond's Cleansing Tissues which are soft, safe and super-absorbent. Harriet Hubbard Ayer Incorporated sold beauty products. They had locations in London, New York and Paris. Their ad simply stated that Luxuria is the World's Most Famous Beauty Cream.



A somewhat more modest ad was from the company called *Dorothy Gray*, with locations in New York, Paris, Chicago, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Washington and Atlantic City. The areas to be focused on, according to Dorothy Gray, were the wrinkles at the eyes or mouth, a crepe-y texture of the throat and a drooping of the underchin. They have a simple and successful treatment for each of these areas.

Lips and teeth:

Dental care was important during the Model A era. Numerous ads for tooth brushes, toothpaste, toothpowder, mouth rinses and gargles were seen. Even chewing gum was promoted for its beauty benefits. Colgate and Pepsodent were vying for your business. They each had a different 'spin' on why you should brush your teeth with their product.

'Everybody knows that the real fascination of any charming woman centers in her possession of



a pair of pretty lips.' So states an ad for Wrigley's chewing gum. They tell us that one of the oldest and most inexpensive beauty secrets is that chewing gum from the Sapota tree keeps your lips young and pretty. Therefore, chew Wrigley's at least 10 minutes a day. 'Note the added loveliness in texture and contour that gradually finds its alluring way to your lips.'

Back in Time

When I talk to young people these days about the times, in which I grew up (1950's), and the technology that we had back then, many of them are in awe that I ever was able to grow up and survive to the age I am today. Consider the following:

No felt tip pens. No aluminum cans. No Andy Griffith Show or the Flintstones, and TV was barely viewable and still black and white. People that I knew were suffering from Polio. The first tractors to have rubber tires and diesel engines. The TV was in its infancy with only AM radio and newspapers to report the news. The first around-the-world telephone call was a miracle. Radar was in its infancy. Scotch tape and nylon bristle toothbrushes were invented. Clarence Birdseye invented the frozen dinner. Railroad technology was advanced with streamlined trains like the Zepher which were fast and reliable. Sliced bread became popular. Notable achievements in aviation included the DC-3, which reduced cross-country travel times and the ability to fly across the Atlantic. Ball point pens, parking meters, and chocolate chip cookies were just invented. Many roads in the US were still unpaved. Refrigerators were now becoming more commonplace. Golden Wrench Article Luggage Rack Restoration

You wouldn't know it from reading what some people post on the internet but Henry Ford wasn't really concerned about absolute purity (at least as far as the Model A was concerned, when it comes to his alignment with a guy with the initials AH that made it impossible for anyone to copy Charlie Chaplin's mustache, but that is a discussion for another time.) So, almost immediately after the Model A started selling, customers began to accessorize their cars, one of those accessories was a luggage rack.

Originally the racks were decorated with what appeared to be wood slats. These were, in fact, wood grained steel with special rivets that held the decorative strips on. Unfortunately, reproduction luggage racks aren't as well made and have real wood slats, these are held on with carriage bolts to mimic the rivets used on the period correct racks. The problem with these carriage bolts is unless immediately after installing a rack on your A you don't remove the nuts from these bolts and apply some Loctite it is likely the nuts will loosen and bolts, nuts and wood slats will fall off your brand-new rack while you are zipping down highway. To combat this, years ago, I cut some new wood strips, used counter sunk screws with acorn nuts on the "outside".

Recently, I noticed that the clear finish that I put on those strips was failing so I pulled the strips off sanded them and applied new stain and new clear coat. Hopefully, this refurbishing work I did will last another 15 years.




