

| How Much Fuel Flow Does a Model A Ford Need? • By Jim Kessler |

Why Ask This Question?


My 1929 Model A Sport Coupe was stalling - especially during acceleration, climbing hills, and even cruising on flat roads around 35 mph. To troubleshoot, I turned to my new QCMAC friends and scoured multiple YouTube videos. The most

consistent advice? There should be a "good" fuel flow when the gas line is disconnected from the carburetor. But what does "good" actually mean? My Model A seemed to have decent flow... yet I wasn't convinced it was good enough.

Measuring Fuel Flow

To find out, I grabbed a measuring vessel from my shop (a Lowe's container marked in 100 ml increments up to 500 ml). I fashioned a hanger wire to hold it in place and used it as a catch basin (attached photo). Then, using my phone's stopwatch, I measured how much fuel flowed in 30 seconds.

Result: About 100 ml, consistently. But again - is that good enough?



Doing The Math

I remembered hearing that Model As typically get between 15 and 25 MPG. Knowing that one gallon equals 3785.4 ml, I opened Excel to calculate how much fuel the car would consume in 30 seconds at various speeds (35, 40 and 45 mph). Estimated 30-second fuel consumption: Between 44.2 ml and 94.6 ml, depending on speed and MPG. So, my 100 ml flow seemed adequate for cruising on flat land at moderate speeds. But what about acceleration or climbing hills?

Clearing The Fuel Line

Since I couldn't find more data, I decided to test the system further. I used my air compressor to force air backwards through the fuel line – removing the fuel cap and sending bursts of air into the line at the carburetor connection. It was messy (the fuel valve had to be open), but with a friend helping, we kept it under control. Afterward, I retested the flow. New result: About 400 ml in 30 seconds – 4x the original flow! Clearly, my fuel delivery system needed attention.

Fixing The Problem

I drained the tank and removed the fuel valve. Using a flashlight and mini camera, I inspected the tank - it looked great. The previous owner had cleaned, repaired, and sealed it during restoration. The valve, however, was dirty and lacked a pencil filter. I replaced it with a new valve with a filter and also swapped out the under-dash fuel line. After refilling the tank, I tested again.

Final Result: About 450+ ml in 30 seconds.

Back On The Road

With the improved fuel flow, the car now performs beautifully, whether accelerating hard or climbing steep hills.

Conclusion!

What Is "good" fuel flow? Based on my experience:

- 100 ml in 30 seconds is not enough
- 450 ml in 30 seconds is more than enough for all driving conditions

Hopefully, this gives you a practical way to measure your own Model A's fuel system, and a clearer idea of what "good fuel flow" really means!

DRIVING TIPS

| Touring Etiquette • By Jim Townsend |

love touring in my Model A, and group tours bring in new members and give us opportunities to get to know fellow club members better. But all too often, touring can become something like a chore when some participants either fail to plan, fail to prepare or just don't seem to care that they may be having a negative impact on others on the outing.

I'll confess, I'm sometimes guilty of not reviewing maintenance needs before a tour, making the odds go up that I may experience problems on the road. There are many articles focused on preparing your car for a tour, so I won't repeat here. But simple things needed are often overlooked.

On the appointed time, arrive at the starting point with gas, ready to go. All attendees are anticipating leaving, and one person 15 minutes late is not good. The solution: Arrive early and with a full tank of gas. Plan ahead and have supplies that you or others may need. Always carry a gallon of water. If you think you may need oil, carry some so you don't have to go shopping when you do. Have a basic tool set and a few spare parts. If your car is running well before the tour, don't experiment to see if you can get it running better. (If it ain't broke, don't fix it). Do make sure you have good brakes and check your wheel lugs to make sure they are tight, and check tire pressure.

When more than a few cars drive together, the leader has a full-time job making sure no one falls to the side of the road. That's not just the job of the leader; all should be sensitive to how the car behind you is doing - if it pulls off the road, stop and check on them.

Also, keep the pace! When cars drop back 50 yards, the leader loses the ability to count the cars behind him. Leave enough space between cars for safe stopping, and for modern cars to pass, but when in towns, close the distance, reducing the chance that traffic lights will separate you from the group. Most leaders will wish to drive at 45 and sometimes up to 50 mph on tour. Have a discussion with the leader if you can't or won't drive at those speeds. If others wish to also drive slow, consider forming a separate group driving at a preferred speed.

We encourage members to tour, assuring them we will help if they experience problems. But be realistic about the condition of your A. If it is not roadworthy, fix it or don't tour in it. Cars without brakes should not be on tour. Cars that overheat regularly spoil the enjoyment of everyone who has to stop. Again, if your car is not roadworthy, fix it before a tour.

Model A Fords, properly maintained are very reliable making touring a fun activity for all. Unforeseen problems do occur, sometimes adding to the experience. We expect some problems but let's try to make tours go more smoothly by planning ahead and showing concern for the enjoyment of others.

A Short History of the Bob • By Karsen Titus



id you know that the first bob, the Castle Bob, was a happy accident? It became famous in 1915 due to ballroom dancer and actress Irene Castle, who cut her long hair before having an appendectomy. While growing her locks back, she used a turban to hide her short tresses ... until a friend encouraged her to show it off and the public fell in love with the look.

By the 1920s, women began to enjoy personal freedom, including the right to have a job, play a sport or cut their hair. Short hair became a symbol of independence. Women everywhere suddenly wanted their hair bobbed, which sent stylists scrambling, because all of their experience had previously been in styling long hair. There were suddenly long lines of women wanting a bob! Other women, who were afraid to commit to short hair, pinned their long hair up to fake a bob without risking negative public sentiment.

In the 1930s, the Great Depression made it difficult for barbers and beauty parlors to have a true brick-and-mortar shop. The need for affordable hair cuts created the fad of road-side beauty salons for both women and men. Above, a stylist in London in 1930 gives her customer a short bob. Later in the decade, bobs became longer, curlier, and "more feminine." Today, the bob remains a popular hair style.

1930 Thanksgiving Day Proclamation: Notwithstanding that our forefathers endured the hardships and privations of a primitive life, surrounded by dangers and solaced only with meager comforts, they nevertheless bequeathed to us a custom of devoting one day of every year to universal thanksgiving to Almighty God, for the blessing of life itself and the means to sustain it, for the sanctuary of home and the joys that pervade it, and for the mercies of His protection from accident, sickness, or death.

Our country has many causes for thanksgiving. We have been blest with distinctive evidence of divine favor. As a nation we have suffered far less than other peoples from the present world difficulties. We have been free from civil and industrial discord. The outlook for peace between nations has been strengthened. In a large view we have made progress upon the enduring structure of our institutions. The arts and sciences that enrich our lives and enlarge our control of nature have made notable advances. Education has been further extended. We have made gains in the prevention of disease and in the protection of childhood.

Now, Therefore, I, Herbert Hoover, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate Thursday, November 27, 1930, as a National Day of Thanksgiving, and do enjoin the people of the United States so to observe it, calling upon them to remember that many of our people are in need and suffering from causes beyond their control, and suggesting that a proper celebration of the day should include that we make sure that every person in the community, young and old, shall have cause to give thanks for our institutions and for the neighborly sentiment of our people.
