

The group marveled at a nearly seven-foot diameter turned bowl inlaid with intricate designs and a large wooden "picture" crafted by a talented 14-year-old. This display included a miniature, multiwheeled truck hauling a massive load, showcasing the creativity and skill found in Amish craftsmanship. Lunch at the Carpenters Cafe provided a delicious break before the next stop.


ontinuing the tour the group viewed "Behalt", A 10 foot by 265-foot mural in the round that vividly depicts Amish and Mennonite heritage from the time of Christ to the present day. The painted oil-on-canvas cyclorama uses unique artistic techniques of line and color to illustrate multiple stories within a vast time-line. The name Behalt, means "to keep, hold, remem-

ber." in the German language. Located in the world's largest Amish community, the mural's history and informative narration captivated everyone. The nearby bookstore offered literature and displays of clothing, highlighting differences among the Amish and other groups of the Anabaptist tradition.

xploring the back roads led the group to a delightful supper at an Amish home, followed by visits to various Amish-owned shops. These included a quilt shop, buggy shop, wheelwright, country furniture store, broom-making demonstration, leather craft shop, and a basket store. Each stop offered a glimpse into the everyday life and entrepreneurial spirit of the Amish community.

hursday's itinerary featured Lehman's
Hardware, where history was displayed on
every surface, and lunch was enjoyed among the
antiques. The Ashery Country Store in Fredericksburg, Ohio offered unique bulk foods, and
deli meat & cheese. Another home-cooked Amish
meal awaited the group that evening. On the way
back to the hotel, the convoy passed an Amish
wedding in progress, held in a large white tent
with buggies, bicycles, and modern cars in attendance—a blend of tradition and modernity


Since the car was stored in a barn, it became necessary to reupholster the seats. They bought the LeBaron Bonney material kit from Snyders Antique Parts. Then,

Another two months have passed since an update, so it's time for another one! In the last one I made progress on the brake system on the Model A pickup truck. As for the issue of the parking brake connecting rod, we have devised a plan to use one of the outer arms and mill it down to fit into the arm that actuates it. That way, we can connect the handle to the cross shaft without trying to salvage the correct part. We are not sure if it will work, but we will give it a solid attempt.


Now onto bigger news! After nine weeks of eager waiting my radiator finally came in! Brassworks did an excellent job on it, and it looks amazing. Now the test will come when the car runs. Once we got that attached, we thought the next step would be to see how the body lines up and make sure it's got everything it should before it gets painted. Over the past weekend my dad and I were able to test fit the body onto the chassis. It seems to line up correctly without any issues, and it has all the thru holes it should. Now we are looking into places to get the parts painted to keep progressing forward.

With the exciting news of the body moving forward, I decided to investigate the seat that my grandfather bought. I believe it to be an insert brand seat. I need to do more research on the brand to try and find the options the seat has and what I need to install. Otherwise, I'm still installing the steering box and trying to free up the rods in the collum I have. We are slowly making progress on other things as well, but those are the main topics of these months.

FORD MODEL "A" **MECHANICAL TIPS ENGINE VIBRATION**



Despite perfect balance, even if you have an A engine counter-weighted and built to Formula 1 or NASCAR standards it will vibrate, and excessively so at certain harmonic RPM points. Why? There are several key issues, addressed in later inline-four cylinder engine designs and chassis builds, as automotive engineering knowledge progressed:

- 1) Due to unequal piston velocity and loading profiles during each of the four cycles (intake, compression, power, exhaust) no inline-four cylinder design engine is balanced' at all RPM's and power (throttle, torque) levels.
- rods, although yielding more torque out, add to the vibration. A's are offset 0.125".
- 3) It was learned that strokes shorter than the bore reduce vibration. A's have longer strokes than bores.
- 4) It was learned that higher compression made for stronger peaks in the torque resulting in more vibes. Most A's now sport increased compression.
- 5) It was learned that a mathematical relationship between the above and con-rod length affects vibration. A's flunk that math test.
- 6) It was learned that a harmonic balancer at the front of the crank reduces secondary 'ringing' of the crank. A's do not have one.

- 7) It was learned that specific controlled ignition advance profiles, coupled with matched camshaft design (engine breathing timing) reduce vibration. Not on A's.
- 8) It was learned that the inherent inline four cylinder vibes could be controlled in established driving RPM's by adding an opposite, out of balance counter shaft either geared or chained to the crank. A's have no counter-shaft.
- 9) There are other points, like what category of vibes are addressed and mitigated to heat energy, by correctly designed and placed elastomer engine and drive train mounts and components. A's? No way! 2) It was learned that offset pistons and or Float-A-Motor's add a crude elastomer, but not everywhere and not necessarily in the correct physical place in the drive-train.
 - 10) Modern cars have vibration dampening/ absorbing components that, unlike springs, convert mechanical vibration energy into heat energy. They are in floorpans, seats, steering, pedals, suspension, just about everything. A's are pretty much bolted solid. Bottom line, have fun blaming everything under the sun for vibes and claiming only Henry had perfect balance, but those are all just stories to tell.

The A is what it is, a moment in automotive design history, now owned and preserved by YOU. Embrace it and enjoy. Unplug your massage chair and drive the Model A!

Belts and Suspenders



Because of the high rise of trousers and loose fit, suspenders were critical pieces to a man's wardrobe. Without them pants would fall down. While it was against etiquette to have suspenders showing, they were colorful and flashy accessories anyways. Suspenders had leather straps that buttoned onto the inside of a trouser waistband. There were clip on suspenders, but they looked less dressy and were prone to slipping off.

With casual outfits and sportscoats a belt was worn instead of suspenders. In summer, belts were also acceptable with formal suits without a vest Garrison Belts were wide two prong leather belts. Many uniformed professions wore the Garrison belt, such as Policemen. Sport Belts were what men wore with their summer suits and casual outfits. White or ivory were the best colors in leather that was braided, pierced, whipstitched, or edged with cording. Western Style Belts featured embossed leather, tooled scrollwork, and metal studs.
