



Alan and Dini joined the Model A Ford Club of Victoria in 1981 when Alan visited our Bendigo Swap Meet site and signed up. Not long after Alan joined MAFCV we realised that he was a special person who had the drive to meet any challenge put in front of him. When Alan & Dini joined MAFCV, Alan was restoring a 1928 Tourer which he finished and registered in 1986. That car took them everywhere including National Meets and Club runs. The picture at right shows Alan "filling" his tank from an historic petrol pump at Old Sandhurst Town. He then built a Speedster - before it became "the thing to do" and his third restoration was a 1930 Town Sedan which, just after restoration, he drove to the Toowoomba National Meet in 2002, effectively without a second gear. Alan was Club Secretary from 1988 to 1990 and when we did not have a Secretary elected at the 1996 AGM, he, in January 1997 offered to be Secretary and continued until November 2007. His service continued beyond being Secretary and in 2008 Alan was awarded Club Member of the Year.





Alan's sense of humour matched that of some other members, notably, Frank Smith & Bob Fretwell. The photo at left speaks for itself and shows Alan on the left, Frank in the middle and Bob on the right. Cleaning the Working Parts of Your Model A

Recently while replacing the engine in one of my Model A's, I was confronted with the problem of what to do about all the dirty nuts, bolts and small parts that I removed and was intending to re-use with the new engine. About 15 years ago, I had completely restored this car with the intention of using it for local Model A outings and club events but also as a car to take on long distance tours. I had powder coated the frame and other major under chassis components to make it easier to keep clean and looking nice. After 19,000 miles of club events and long distance touring, while the engine and undercarriage looked reasonably clean, when I started to take things apart, I found everything was a bit dirtier than expected and most components had a coating of grease and oil. Certainly, with a new freshly painted engine being installed, I wanted everything else to be clean and presentable.

After removing the old engine and transmission, I sprayed CRC Engine degreaser on the front suspension components and areas of the chassis that were dirty and greasy. After letting it set over night, I pushed the car outside and just hosed off the front suspension and engine bay. I was surprised how clean everything was. The powder coated components were really easy to clean up. I was careful not to get any engine degreaser on the fenders or body as I was not sure how it would react with these paint finishes. To clean the firewall, I used Simple Green spray cleaner. I have been using this cleaner for many years with very good results. It is not hard on finishes and does a good job of removing dirt and is easy to rinse off with water.

I used a shallow flat metal tray to clean all the small parts and nuts and bolts. I then sprayed both sides of everything with

the engine degreaser and let it set for an hour or so then rinsed them off with hot water. For a final clean, I could use either Simple Green or liquid dish washing soap and then rinsed with hot water. Liquid dish washing soap does a good job of removing the oily film that can remain after using the engine cleaner. Dish washing soap also does a good job cleaning your hands and the lemon scent will make everything smell good.

For really dirty parts, I will first soak them in kerosene and then use simple green or dish washing soap. Be careful using kerosene. It is flammable but does a good job cleaning really grimy parts. If you are cleaning parts with kerosene, use in a well ventilated area away from any open flame and be sure to store it properly.

With a little effort and good cleaning agents, it is not difficult to keep the working parts of your Model A clean and presentable.





Use Hand Protection When Working on Your Model A

To protect your hands when working on greasy or oily components of your Model A, it is a good idea to use disposable gloves made especially for the mechanic. This is especially true when using solvents or harsh cleaning agents. When finished, be sure to wash your hands thoroughly and use a good hand lotion. Good oil and solvent resistant disposable gloves are available at most auto parts stores.

MODEL A FORD NATIONAL MEET ALBANY W.A. 2026

Care & Feeding of Engine Thrust Bearings By Chris Wickersham

Care and Feeding of the Engine Thrust Bearings or - Keep Your Foot off the Clutch Pedal !!!

The Model A Ford engine is equipped with bearings that are designed to limit the fore and aft movement of the crankshaft and keep it centered in the engine block. These thrust bearings surfaces' are designed into the rear main bearing of the engine. The Babbitt bearing material overlaps the front and rear of the rear main bearing bore and is finished machined when the main bearings are line bored. The crankshaft has a flange on both sides of the rear main bearing that is finish ground. These flanges will bear against the thrust surfaces of the rear main bearing Babbitt and keeps the crankshaft centered.

Normally there is very little for or aft load on these thrust surfaces but that all changes when you put your foot on the clutch. It takes considerable force to push on the fingers of the clutch to cause it to release. This force wants to push the crankshaft toward the front of the engine and up against the rear thrust surface of the rear main bearing. Extended use of the clutch or using a heavy duty clutch with stiff springs will increase the load on the thrust bearing which can lead to premature wear.


The Model A crankshaft thrust bearings were not over designed and it is not uncommon at all to find the rear thrust bearing all worn out. When Henry designed the Model B engine, the crankshaft bearing diameters and the thrust bearing surface areas were increased and the lubrication to the rear thrust surface was improved. You will find many Model A engines that are in good condition and should run for many more miles but the rear thrust bearing material is badly worn or missing entirely.

Now what do you do if you have an otherwise perfectly good engine that has a bad thrust bearing. The better parts supplier offer a replacement rear main oil seal insert that is made out of brass and incorporates a new thrust surface for the rear flange of the crank. With a little work, this part can often be installed without removing the engine. At this time, there is not a similar part available for the Model B engine.

How do you prevent this from happening with your Model A? The best thing you can do to make life easier for your thrust bearings is to KEEP YOUR FOOT OFF THE CLUTCH!!! When you come to a stop light and you find you may have to wait for a period of time before you can proceed, put the transmission in neutral and take your foot off the clutch pedal. This will take the load off the thrust bearing and also will take the clutch load off the throw out bearing which will add to its life. Another thing you can do is to adjust the clutch so it has a lot of free play, or engages when the pedal is closer to the floor. This will reduce the amount the springs in the clutch assembly are compressed which reduces the forward load on the crankshaft. Just be sure the clutch will fully release when the pedal is fully depressed.

When rebuilding the engine or replacing the clutch assembly, consider using a later ford "V-8" clutch or a more modern diaphragm clutch. These clutches take less force to disengage and not only will it be easier to push the clutch pedal down but they also lessen the load on the throw out bearing and the crankshaft thrust bearing.

Remember, when waiting at a stop light, put the transmission in neutral and TAKE YOUR FOOT OFF THE CLUTCH PEDAL!!

The Dangers of Using an Original Model A Fan By Chris Wickersham

The Dangers of Using an Original Model A Fan

The subject of the dangers of running an original 2 blade Model A fan has been discussed many times in the past, so you may be wondering why once again it is being talked about. Well, it seems there are folks out there who are still driving their Model A's with an original 2 blade fan who have not gotten the message, so again this issue is being discussed.

Why Are We Again Talking about 2 Blade Fans?

One of the participant's was returning from the recent CCRG Convention in Santa Maria in his Model A when all the sudden there was a big bang and the car started to shake violently. The engine was shut off and after the hood was

raised it was found that one blade of the 2 blade fan was missing and the fins on the whole backside of the radiator were mashed flat.

Upon closer inspection, it was discovered that the fan was an original factory steel 2 blade fan that would have been installed on the car when it was new. Luckily, the missing blade Original Model A fan that failed did not go thru the hood or do



additional damage. With all the past articles that have been written and all the many discussions about the dangers of continuing to use original fans, you would think that everyone would have gotten the word but I guess it is still necessary to periodically bring up the subject.

Why Do Original 2 Blade Fans Fail?

More than 60 years ago, when I first came into the Model A hobby, it was commonly known that the original 2 blade fan was subject to fatigue and cracking and it was not uncommon to hear about a fan blade breaking off and either going thru the hood or taking out the radiator.



What can happen when Ford even changed the design a blade breaks off

of the fan in late '31 to help prevent this from happening and after the end of Model A production, Ford offered a fan of a completely different design as a replacement part.

The main reason that the original fan blades fail is that they are made from 2 pieces of formed sheet metal that are welded together and then welded to a center hub and pulley. When completed, each blade is actually 2 thicknesses of sheet steel. Moisture will get between the 2 layers of steel and corrosion will set in. After time, the corrosion will weaken the blades where they attach to the hub and stress cracks will begin to appear. Eventually, these cracks will progress to the point where a blade will completely break off. This usually happens at higher engine speeds when the fan blades are under the most stress. If you are lucky, the blade will go down and get caught in the cross member behind the radiator but most often, the blade will either go thru the hood or severely damage the radiator.

How Do I Know If My Model A Has an Original 2 Blade Fan?

Original 2 blade fans are easy to detect. Raise the hood and see if you have a 2 blade fan which is shaped like a propeller, like the original design. If so, hold a magnet up to it and if the Magnet sticks to the fan it is made from steel and it is most likely an original fan. If

the magnet will not stick, the fan most likely is a copy of the original 2 blade fan but made out of aluminum.

What Do I Replace an Original Fan With?

Currently, there are two options when choosing a new fan. The aluminum copy of the original fan is a popular choice. This fan has the same shape as the original and works very well. Many choose this fan because it has the same appearance as the original steel fan.

A second option is the multi blade plastic fan which also works well but some consider the appearance to be too "modern" for a Model A. Both fans are available from most of the better Model A parts suppliers and both will give good service.

Protecting & Enhancing Your Car's Finish

New Fans to Look Out for

Currently on the market are both a 2 and 4 blade version of a fan with steel blades that are attached to an aluminum or steel hub with 4 bolts. The single thickness steel blades are not stiff and will flex, eventually fatigue and fail in the same manner as the original factory fans. These fans, while available new, should be avoided.

Other Fans That May Be in Service

Ford also made 4 blade fans for the 32-34 Model B 4 cylinder engines. Thru the years, these were often used as a replacement for the original 2 blade fans and a lot of them are still in service. These fans should be periodically inspected for cracks in the blades and the rivets attaching the blades to the hubs becoming loose.

Under no circumstance should a fan with badly rusted or pitted blades be used. Fatigue cracks can develop which can lead to blade failure.

Summary

Having a blade separate from the rest of the fan can cause extensive damage. Do not use an original factory 2 blade fan. Do not use the poor quality 2 and 4 blade fans where the blades attach to the center hub with bolts. Do not use any fan where the blades are badly pitted or rusty. Periodically inspect the fan to be sure the fan is tight on the water pump shaft and the blades are all in good condition. Consider using either an aluminum 2 blade fan or a multi-blade plastic fan when purchasing a replacement fan.

Tech Tip

When installing an aluminum fan, use a flat washer under the nut. This will help keep the nut from digging into the aluminum and the fan becoming loose on the water pump shaft.

Protecting & Enhancing Your Car's Finish

Our Technical Director, Chris Wickersham, provides lots of valuable information on how to keep our cars in top running

condition. Every member should pay careful attention to his words, because the man knows whereof he speaks!



In addition to the mechanical aspects of our cars, we want them to look good. So I thought I would look into various ways of protecting

look into various ways of protecting the finish of our cars, while making them as shiny as possible.

There are any number of commercial products available, many of which do a pretty good job. Meguiar's, Turtle Wax, Mother's, and others have a wide variety to choose from. I decided to test some of the offerings to see what I would recommend to Santa Anita Aers to keep their cars shiny and protected.

I also spent some time on the Internet searching for alternatives to these better-known names. Looking for that little-known trick that would give us a leg up on others. My time was rewarded when I came across a scientific-sounding article extolling the benefits of an unexpected alternative: bacon grease.

Now bacon grease is a little tricky to apply to your car's finish. You need a lot of it! But, that's also one of the benefits: it gives you an excuse to eat a lot of bacon. Now, some of us may have blood pressure that's a little high and bacon is one of the things our doctor has mandated that we steer clear of. But, after all, we do have a duty to take care of our favorite car. And sometimes we need to consider competing interests. I, for one, am willing to sacrifice for my trusty Model A. Besides, I like bacon!

You need to apply the bacon grease in an enclosed garage. Otherwise, you'll have every dog in the neighborhood crowded around your car, impeding your progress. The bacon grease should be warm. In fact, every 15 minutes or so you'll need to go back in the house and fry up two or three more strips of bacon. Bon appétit!

Apply the bacon grease with a brush, preferably a 2-inch, high quality paint brush. After applying a liberal dose, let it dry thoroughly. There is no need to buff it; it will naturally dry to a tough, very shiny finish. One caution, do not park your car for any length of time in direct sunlight! It tends to melt in heat, running down the sides of the car. Sometimes it drips on the brake drums and those mechanical brakes are even less effective with bacon grease on the drums.

I haven't actually had the opportunity to try this out on my car yet. Let me know how it works out for ya.

P.S. You might try adding a quart of wine to the mixture. Mix one pint with the bacon grease then consume the rest yourself; It makes the application a bit easier.
