AUTOMOBILES – The Early Years

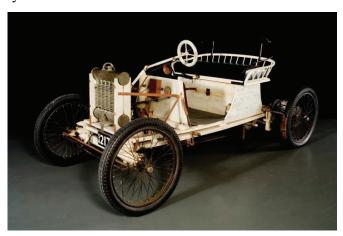

Part 9 The backyard builders

In the early part of the twentieth century many men couldn't afford to buy a motor car so they made their own. A lot of their home made vehicles did not have a name but some had descriptive nicknames by their builders. One such vehicle was called the "Jigger".

This was made in 1904 by a South Australian watch maker, Mr Ohlmeyer. It was made up of bits and pieces found around the property and had a single cylinder stationary engine to propel it. This vehicle was in use up to 1969 by his family.

It has survived and is on display at the National Motor Museum in South Australia.

Also in 1904 a Dr E. Kinmont built in South Australia a two and three HP motor car which had a two speed gearbox but no reverse gears. It was a very lightly built car that you just got out and pushed it backward. It appears to be unnamed.

Some of the cars that were one offs that were given names were, Richter, Trevethan, Bullock, Hammer, Lean, Puckeridge, Knowles, Acme, Roo, there was even a Holden not connected to the GMH vehicle.

Another builder closer to home was John Yaeger of Coraki near Lismore.

At the early age of seventeen he arrived home with an early Indian motorcycle which his parents immediately condemned and told him to get rid of it.

He took it to a shed not far from the home and transformed the motorcycle into a three wheel car which he drove for nearly ten years till the engine exploded.

His second car was an open sports made up of parts from the discarded family car.

The third car he started building in 1960 with all new parts including a six cylinder Humber engine he brought out from England. The car eventually was never completed due to him getting on in years and it stood in his garage for over thirty years.

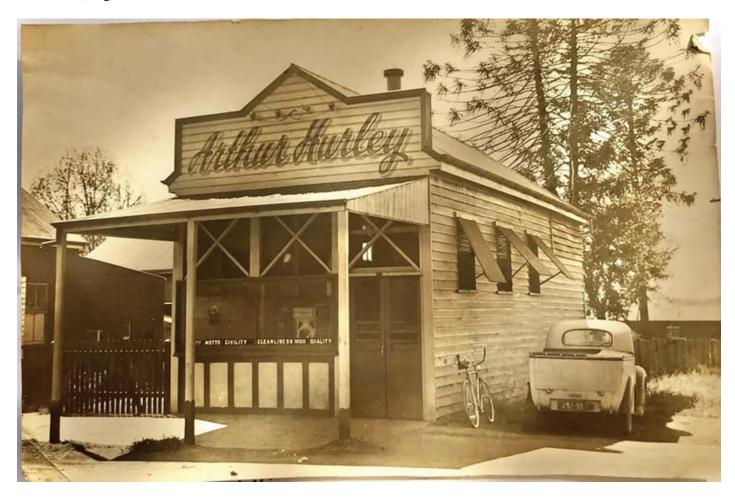

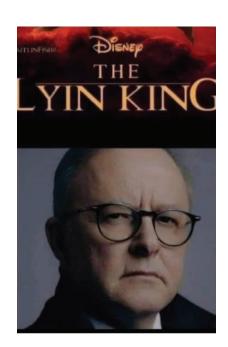
Kennedy family as custodians.

Holden has had a long association with the station wagon. Starting in 1954, Holden had built a number of prototype or "test mule" station wagons in their own workshops

Conflicting reports have surfaced over the years on the actual numbers built Estimates range from one based on an earlier 48-215 sedan, to 24 in both 2-door and 4-door variants. The only one that still exists today is thought to be the 48-215 car.

At around the same time a body and engineering firm based in Hampton, near Melboume started converting FJ Holden sedans into station wagons. S.H. Cordell Motor Body and Engineering Works were known to have converted at least 15 FX and FJ sedans into station wagons. This conversion was not cheap, costing well over 400 pounds (\$800) If brought the total cost of a rolling finished car to over \$1,500 pounds (\$3.000)







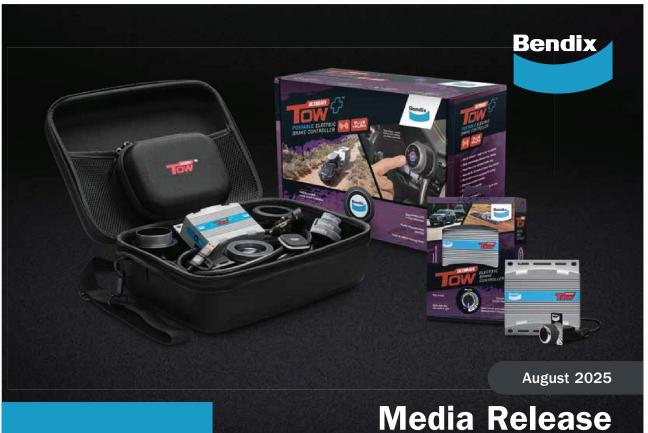

Bendix's tips for avoiding trailer sway

The number of caravan and camper trailers on local roads rose sharply during the COVID pandemic, as international travel restrictions saw holiday options narrow. While things have now normalised, caravan sales have remained strong ever since.

More caravans and campervans on the roads mean that many have first time owners, with little or no towing experience, especially towing larger caravans. It's no surprise then that there's a correlation between increased ownership rates and a rise in accidents involving caravans in recent years.

Despite the large size of many modern caravans, no additional training or licensing is needed for owners before they hitch up and hit the road. While caravan

towing courses are widely available through specialist training outlets, most owners instead learn as they go.

Although some approaches to safe towing come down to common sense such as allowing for longer stopping distances, being aware of a caravan's large dimensions and how this may affect steer angles, overhead branches and street signs, other aspects of towing are trickier.

The phenomenon known as 'trailer sway' is a prime example. Trailer sway occurs when the caravan or trailer begins to move from side to side or 'fish tail' on its own; it can become uncontrollable and even cause the caravan and tow vehicle to flip in a worst-case scenario.

What causes trailer sway?

Trailer sway can be triggered by several things including poorly distributed loads on the trailer or inside the caravan, incorrect tyre pressures, sudden change in direction and excessive speed. External factors such as blustery winds can also set it off.

Drivers can mitigate the chances of trailer sway by slowing down, correctly maintaining their caravan or trailer – including having the correct/uniform tyre pressure according to manufacturer recommendations – and distributing weight correctly.

When it comes to weight distribution, in the case of a caravan, best practice is to have 60 per cent of the weight forward of the axle and to avoid anything heavy at the rear of the caravan, because weight at the back can cause a pendulum effect.

Brake controllers with 'break away' function

Having a quality brake controller on your tow vehicle such as Bendix's Ultimate TowTM or Ultimate Tow+TM Portable brake controllers, provides a fall back should the driver have taken the necessary precautions but still encounters trailer sway.

Legally, all trailers with a gross trailer mass (the weight of the trailer with everything in it) of between 750kg and 2,000kg need to be fitted with either a mechanical or electrical braking system. And anything over 2,000kg requires an electric, or electric over hydraulic brake and an electric break-away function.

If sway is noticed, at the press of a button, the driver can activate the trailer's brakes independently of the tow vehicle's, bringing the trailer or caravan back into line and under control. The brake controller can also detect if the trailer or caravan becomes unhitched from the tow vehicle, and automatically apply the caravan brakes to minimise the chance of a serious accident.

For a modest outlay, investment in a brake controller provides those who tow trailers, caravans, boats and the like with a simple and cost-effective way of meeting legal requirements, while also giving them peace of mind in knowing they'll be better able to control trailer sway if it arises. Of course, a brake controller will also greatly assist during general towing and reduce braking strain on the tow vehicle.

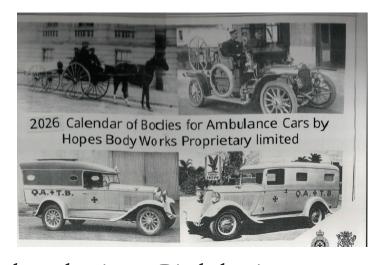
2026 Calendar Ambulance Restoration

CITRIC ACID BATH



You may be aware that Jeff Cox is restoring a Morris Z ute. Another member Stuart Westermann invited Jeff to soak his mudguards in his citric acid bath.

Jeff was quite impressed with the process. It removed all of the rust but the paint remained. These guards were subsequently paint stripped and then coated in epoxy primer. Jeff thought we could do with a similar tank at the workshop.

He was subsequently given a suitable container and the management committee approved a trial. We made a lid for the tank in the workshop and fitted a lock as well.



Citric Acid is used in cooking and appears to be quite safe. We bought a 20kg bucket of the substance from a chemical company in Cairns.

Stuart advised us to use about a third of the bucket to the tank almost full of water. We conducted a trial with an old bonnet and a wheel which were submerged in the solution.

After a week we hosed these parts and the rust as well as any loose paint came away.





Some other stuff is now dangling in the bath. We also added a little bit more powder to make the solution a bit more effective. So now there is around 8Kg of citric acid in around 800 litres of water.

The key to the padlock on the tank has been stored above the sink near the sign in book. If you place something in the tank one week, you could pick it up the following week. It works best on rust on iron/steel surfaces. Be careful with non ferrous metals.

Using the acid bath may save you time and money. You may have to do a final clean in the sand blaster but quite a bit of time should be saved and the sand blasting cabinet and its contents should last a bit longer.

It would be a good idea to wash your hands after use.

SIVs UPDATES

QHMC BULLETIN 5 of 2013

To: QHMC Affiliated Clubs

Subject: SIV Support to Schools, Charities and the Community - policy guidance

BACKGROUND

Over the last several years, QHMC has been approached by affiliated clubs for interpretation of the Special Interest Vehicle registration arrangements (SIV) guidelines in relation to the use of SIV vehicles in support of schools conducting formals and similar events. Recently, a couple of our clubs bypassed the QHMC committee and sought their own guidance direct from DTMR. The results have been less than encouraging to those clubs.

2. The SIV guidelines are clear enough. All clubs need to do is to sensibly interpret them in order to remain within the guidelines and within the spirit of the SIV arrangements. If clubs require further guidance in arriving at a decision, then the first point of contact must necessarily be our own QHMC committee. Rod Graydon is currently our DTMR Liaison Officer on the QHMC committee. Rod has the experience and knowledge of dealing with DTMR in such matters. Rod will provide most guidance immediately. If not, he knows where to find answers very quickly. If contacting Rod by email, send a cc to the QHMC Secretary and President also. Our affiliated clubs should avail themselves of this service where further interpretation and guidance is required.

INTERPRETATION AND CLARIFICATION OF EXISTING GUIDELINES

- 3. QHMC consulted DTMR last week at its quarterly liaison meeting and came away with an agreed interpretation as explained below relating to SIV Support to Schools, Charities and the Community non relative (does not alter the existing SIV guideline in relation to ceremonies for immediate family).
- 4. The overarching requirements for an **event for non-relatives** are that the event is to be conducted as an official club event, have an educational value, a charitable endeavour and be within the spirit of the SIV quidelines.

Clubs and members must also abide by the following detailed guidelines: (i) Event must be recorded and promoted through the car club newsletter,

- (ii) No direct payment to the SIVS vehicle owner is permitted (donations may be made to a charity nominated in the event flyer, newsletter listing),
- (iii) Event must commence from a common point; no door to door service, (iv) Event must terminate at a common point, e.g. at the venue,
- (v) Display vehicles at the termination point, and
- (vi) Charity collection at the car display or termination point (charity must be a recognised charity; and event co ordinator or designated person must have authorisation from the relevant charity to act as a fundraiser at this event).
- 5. The above requirements are not new, they are simply an extrapolation of the existing published SIV guidelines resulting in an approved interpretation for your club's use. They are very close to the guidance provided by the QHMC Executive to one of our country clubs back in 2010 further reason that QHMC has to be the first point of contact for consistent and accurate interpretation of guidelines.
- 6. I trust this information is of value to your club and will provide you with greater scope to support your community. Please contact myself or Rod Graydon for further clarification if required.

ROMA HISTORICAL MOTOR CLUB FORMAL RUN GUIDELINES - Roma Schools

Updated 07.02.24

One of the club's most frequently asked questions is whether we can "hire out" historic vehicles for weddings or formals.

The short answer is: No. To hire out vehicles a person must have a taxi or limousine license or be registered for ride sharing.

A club member with a vehicle on full registration may be prepared to use their car for formals or weddings, "without fee or reward", as a goodwill gesture.

If a vehicle is on restricted registration, it cannot be used for ceremonial purposes (weddings, formals) except those: "involving immediate family members provided this is not done for fee or reward. Immediate family means parents, grandparents, sons, daughters, grandchildren but not extended family relationships such as nephews and nieces." This is a direct quote from the guidelines.

An exception has been made to this for formals provided the club organises a club run for the formal. This run is to leave from one starting point to the formal, with students being dropped off to this starting point. The club also needs to display the vehicles at the venue. These guidelines have been provided by our governing body the Queensland Historic Motoring Council Inc.

As you can appreciate all of this takes some time for the club to organise and source available vehicles and drivers for the run, so advance notice is required to put all of this into place and to match students with vehicles.

Complying with our regulations means that we will all continue to enjoy the lower registration fee for vehicles registered under the

SIVS scheme. A vehicle being used outside the guidelines is not covered by CTP insurance and may incur a fine.

RESPONSE FROM TMR

As discussed, the Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) undertook a review of the QHMC BULLETIN 5 of 2013 following an enquiry from a QPS officer who was acting on behalf of a historical vehicle club. The officer shared with us the QHMC BULLETIN 5 of 2013. The club was seeking formal clarification to confirm the requirements for SIV vehicle participation in events with non-relatives as members of the club wanted to offer their vehicles to students attending school formals.

TMR would like to propose a minor update to the bulletin to ensure it matches current SIV guidelines outlined on the TMR's website. We are proposing the wording is changed in section 4 of the bulletin which describes the requirements for SIV vehicle participation in events with non-relatives.

The current wording is:

Clubs and members must also abide by the following detailed guidelines:

- (i) Event must be recorded and promoted through the car club newsletter,
- (ii) No direct payment to the SIVS vehicle owner is permitted (donations may be made to a charity nominated in the event flyer, newsletter listing),
- (iii) Event must commence from a common point; no door to door service,
- (iv) Event must terminate at a common point, e.g. at the venue,
- (v) Display vehicles at the termination point, and
- (vi) Charity collection at the car display or termination point (charity must be a recognised charity; and event coordinator or designated person must have authorisation from the relevant charity to act as a fundraiser at this event).

TMR recommends that section (i) to (vi) is replaced with:

- (i) Club members must carry paperwork that supports their reason for travel during the event. This could include an event flyer, club newsletter or a club calendar of events. Alternatively, digital proof in the form of events listed on a club website or social media page is also accepted.
- (ii) A fee or reward must not be charged for the use of the vehicle, this includes compensation for fuel used.
- (iii) If donations are made, the club should not receive any direct payments. All donations should be managed directly through the school.

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- (iv) Charity collection at the car display or termination point (charity must be a recognised charity; and event coordinator or designated person must have authorisation from the relevant charity to act as a fundraiser at this event).
- (v) Event must commence from a common point; no door to door service.
- (vi) Event must terminate at a common point, e.g. at the venue.

While these changes are not major, it is important that the QHMC bulletin is in accordance with the wording used in the SIV guidelines outlined on the TMR website to minimise future confusion for historic vehicle clubs.

- (2) Part of a sanctioned Incorporated Club event provided this is not done for fee or reward.

 This is expanded on in the above amendment to QHMC BULLETIN 5 of 2013 provided by TMR on 12th February 2024.

Note: TMR do not refer to Formal but to an Event. My suggestion is to call a School Formal a School Event to fit in with the guidelines. This is at your Clubs discretion.

Below is a clarification and reminder of SIVs guidelines

Suggested wording for guide to clubs for Formals provided by Karen Dawes-thank you, Roma Historical Motor Club Inc

EMAIL FROM TMR

"Thank you for inviting the Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) to review the Queensland Historic Motoring Council (QHMC) Guide concerning school formal runs as a sanctioned event for incorporated vehicle clubs.

It is imperative that, while the QHMC is eager to develop and publish its own guide, the Special Interest Vehicle (SIV) guide available on the TMR website must be acknowledged as the source of information. The relevant webpage can be found at: https://www.qld.gov.au/transport/registration/fees/concession/special-interest/restrictions

I have incorporated track-changes into the draft of your guide to clearly indicate the modifications suggested by TMR.

Given the nature of this document as a general guide, TMR advises against including overly specific information. This approach ensures that the content remains applicable across a variety of individual events, which may differ significantly in their requirements and outcomes"

SCHOOL FORMAL RUNS AS A SANCTIONED INCORPORATED VEHICLE CLUB EVENT GUIDE FOR CLUBS

- (i) The event must be recorded and promoted through the car club newsletter, website or be an event listed on the social media page of the club. Club members are recommended to carry paperwork that supports their reason for travel during the event. This could include an event flyer, club newsletter or a club calendar of events. Alternatively, digital proof in the form of events listed on a club website or social media page is also accepted.
- (ii) A fee or reward must not be charged for the use of the vehicle; this includes compensation for fuel used. Donations may be made to a nominated charity by the student or their family, or, if desired, an authorised representative of the nominated charity may be present at the event to collect the donations.

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- (iii) Event must commence from a common point, no door to door service.
- (iv) Event must terminate at a common point, e.g. at the venue.

THE TMR WEBSITE

a special interest vehicle is restricted. The vehicle must not be used for:

General purposes – for example, to commute to and from the registered operator's place of employment, running down to the shops, and other forms of everyday vehicle use.

Hire or reward – a fee cannot be charged for use of the vehicle, and the owner cannot receive any consideration or reward for supplying the vehicle.

Providing a booked hire service – to use your vehicle to provide a booked hire service you need to meet the requirements of a booked hire service licences.

d anyone driving your special interest vehicle must only use the vehicle for:

participating in incorporated vehicle club rallies or events (of your own car club, another car club or the Australian Street Rod Federation), including impromptu events as long as the event has been sanctioned by your own car club.

- a rally is a social event where a parade of special interest vehicles travel together for competition or to meet at an agreed location. Rallies and events must be listed before the event in the incorporated club newsletter or on the incorporated club's website or social media page (or in another manner approved by the club or Australian Street Rod Federation, such as the club calendar of events). Information such as location (start and end), meeting time and date of the event should be included.
- an impromptu event that has been initiated by a club member involving one or more vehicles. To attend an impromptu event, each club must comply with the following:
 - send an invitation to the wider club members to attend the event
 - either
 - the car club or Australian Street Rod Federation committee must endorse the event in advance
 - comply with published club guidelines as to what is a valid event, where they
 exist
 - before the event, list it in the newsletter, on the website, or social media page (or in another manner approved by the club or Australian Street Rod Federation, such as the club calendar of events).

Note: Incorporated vehicle clubs should maintain a register of endorsed impromptu events. This register should contain information on the impromptu event, such as location (start and end), meeting time and date.

participating in processions for which a Special Events Permit has been issued under the *Transport* Operations (Road Use Management – Accreditation and Other Provisions) Regulation 2015.

exhibiting the vehicle in displays, fetes or similar functions conducted for religious, charitable or educational purposes.

ceremonial purposes (such as weddings, funerals) involving immediate and de facto family members, or as part of a sanctioned incorporated club event, provided this is not done for fee or reward. Immediate and de facto family means parents, grandparents, sons, daughters, grandchildren, adopted children and adopted grandchildren, but not extended family members such as aunts, uncles, nephews and nieces.

preparing for, proceeding to, and returning from any of the above activities, including events in other states and territories in which the club is directly involved with.

- direct travel to and from an approved inspection station to get a safety certificate or certificate of inspection before offering the vehicle for sale.
- travel in order to have the vehicle repaired is allowed. There is no distance restriction, however, such travel must be reasonable and justifiable by the vehicle operator.
- road testing within a 30km radius from the place where the vehicle is garaged or is being repaired.
 The purpose of the travel must be to road test the vehicle following repair or restoration, or for general vehicle maintenance and not for any other purpose. This does not include use as an everyday means of transport. A passenger may travel in your vehicle to assist with road testing—only if your vehicle can legally carry passengers.

Find out about what to carry in your vehicle to support your reason for travel.

Carrying passengers

Vehicles with a special interest vehicle concession are permitted to carry passengers when travelling to and from an event permitted for special interest vehicle use (for example a rally, fete or procession). The vehicle must be able to legally carry passengers and all safety requirements must be met.

Buses are permitted to carry non-fare paying passengers for journeys (joy-rides) from an event (for example, a fete) and return provided the length of the journey does not exceed 5km. Payment of any kind cannot be received for these journeys.

Carrying a load and/or towing a trailer

Heavy motor vehicles over 4.5t GVM are permitted to carry a load provided the loaded GVM or gross combination mass (GCM) does not exceed 50% of the maximum permitted mass for the vehicle configuration. This mass is based on the lesser of:

- Individual axle ratings
- Tyre manufacturer's limits
- Manufacturer's GVM or GCM
- Regulation mass limits.

Motor vehicles (light and heavy) are permitted to tow a trailer with a load as long as you comply with the above usage for special interest vehicles and adhere to the vehicle's towing capacity.

Any load carried must be in relation to or part of the reason for the vehicle's use under the special interest vehicle scheme or required as part of the vehicle's display, for example, promotional items, signage, shade gazebo, chairs. You cannot carry a load for hire or reward.

Lighting

If your special interest vehicle does not have permanent lighting, you must carry a removable lighting system with the vehicle at all times and use that system whenever lighting would normally be required. Carbide lights are acceptable where that type of light was originally fitted.

Seatbelt exemptions for historic vehicles

In Queensland, an exemption from seatbelt requirements for historic vehicles manufactured with no seatbelts only applies for children 7 years and over. Children under 7 years of age are not permitted to travel in a vehicle unless they are restrained in a properly fastened and adjusted Australian Standard approved child restraint.

Your historic vehicle will need to have approved restraint/s and anchorage point/s installed for children under 7 years of age to be able to travel in the vehicle. This modification must be performed by an Approved Person and must have certification and a modification plate attached to the vehicle.

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
