



Air filters fact or fiction.



The number one consideration is not opinion at all it is FACT.....

The carburetor must be designed for air filter use otherwise as the filter gets dirty the engine will run richer.

This extra rich fuel will wash the oil from the cylinder walls doing far more damage than dust.

As screen and paper air filters get dirty they will cause issues with ALL Model A and B Ford released carburetors creating unbalanced air to fuel ratios.

This is because of the external float bowl venting design method used on ALL Ford carburetors released for use on the Model A and B engines.

A dirty or restrictive air filter doesn't just slow down the air flow but causes extra air to be pulled through the external float bowl vent hole forcing extra fuel through the jetting.

When the air filters on internally vented carburetors that are designed for air filter use, get dirty everything is restricted there is no external vent hole or "back door" to pull unregulated air through.

This internal vent design method is known as a pressure balancing circuit.

This circuit can be machined/added to ALL the carburetors released by Ford for use on the Model A and B engines.

NONE of carburetors released by Ford for use on the Model A or B were designed to use an air filter that's because they lack a pressure balance circuit.

This is carburetor design theory not opinion!

You will never see an updraft carburetor used with gravity feed fuel supply and an air filter used on a production vehicle, this is a dangerous combination due to trapping leaking fuel and vapors.

Some will say... that's why I have a wire mesh / air maze to stop fire.

While it might be true that flames won't go thru screen, it does not stop an engine from back firing.

A back fire is only a quick pop with nothing to burn, unless you have an air cleaner assembly trapping fuel!

No Model A ever burnt down because it didn't have an air cleaner or air maze... just the opposite they trap dripping fuel and are the reason for fire.

This never would've happened if the fuel was just allowed to drip / run out onto the ground.

A properly sized, designed and tested air filter and carburetor is a must for an engine in a dusty environment.

Common today is to visit the plumbing store and build this elaborate system of twists and turns with piping trying to get the filter away from the heat.

The quickest way to get air in the carburetor is straight in, every time you change direction you slow the air down, some systems actually reduce horsepower greatly.

Just because it cost \$80 and has a name brand filter doesn't mean it's any good.

I can tell you that if your air filter tubing assembly has bends in it that you are reducing the flow into the carburetor.

I have a super flow bench and I can measure very accurately the CFM going through a carburetor.

Only a single elbow facing down doesn't have negatively affect airflow into these carburetors And then every 90° elbow after that reduces airflow.

Even with the K&N filter if it gets dirty airflow is going to be reduced and so will performance and economy.

Carburetors work on vacuum from the engine, ram air does not work in this design, otherwise they would have faced the carburetor inlet forward.

Some vehicles use an oil bath system.

Due to the design of an oil bath air cleaner even when the oil is dirty they don't restrict air flow like screen or paper element air cleaners.

Fords engine compartment was designed to be kept clean by the air coming in the radiator this slightly pressurized the engine compartment.

The air was forced down the sides of the engine and out the louvers... the engine pans are multi function.

This is why these engines have lasted so long without an air cleaner.

Dirt road dust is churned behind the vehicle, not in front of it or under the hood.

You'd have to be tailgating all the time to have dust issues.

I'm not against filters, I would always use a properly designed one in a dusty environment, I would also be sure my carburetor was designed to use one.

You're welcome to do whatever you want it's your car.

Personally I wouldn't waste my time with an air filter, there's just not enough dust going in that motor to ruin it. The negatives just far out weigh the positives in this particular application.




