Wagon Tales: Episode 2 By Dave Knapp

Clunk! No matter what you are driving, that sound is never a good one. If you have ever driven, or ridden in a station wagon you know it is a very noisy vehicle. There are more squeaks and rattles than a semi-truck full of baby toys. To our surprise, heard well above the squeaks and rattles, was a loud CLUNK. "What on earth could THAT be?" This was something different; it was not to be ignored. As the new noise repeated itself several times, it was obvious this needed some immediate attention.

Back home, up on jack stands, the wiggle test ensued. What's the wiggle test? Well, you jack up the car, then grab each wheel and wiggle, while watching each part of the steering and front suspension for unplanned movements. You can also have someone wiggle the steering wheel while you watch. This test revealed a pretty serious problem—the steering box was loose from the frame mount! There wasn't an immediate danger, but the longer ignored, the worse this would get, and eventually could lead to catastrophic failure. After disassembly of the engine pan, drag link, starter, steering column interior mount, and steering box/frame mount bolts, the true damage was visible—the mounting bolts were grooved and the frame holes were egg shaped and chamfered. This had been a developing problem for a while, but we couldn't ignore it anymore. It was time to dig out the MIG welder and get to work.


After welding and cleaning up the frame holes to make them round again, a little paint was added where the welding was done. To deal with the worn frame mount bolts, a parts order was made to Snyder's Antique Auto Parts for new bolts and some other bits we needed for both of our Model A's. This gave us a few days to pay some attention to a few other "while-I'm-at-it" items. Note to self—pay more attention to the transmission fluid level. The end result is a new shiny spot on a Model A that didn't previously have shiny spots—and no more clunk. At least it still has plenty of squeaks and rattles! Happy motoring!

But I oppose having them infused into the glory and majesty our American red, white and blue holds. Our flag flies alone, above, high above all others, with the love and respect it has earned.

I was also taught in elementary school that my country is not, and has never been, a "perfect country". But I was reminded often enough that this is the "best country". After all, how many of us Americans have emigrated from our country to return and live on the continents of our ancestors? That number remains so miniscule, so small, that it cannot be calculated.

When people refuse to rise in honor of our American flag, they exhibit the fact that they cannot rise above their own historical ignorance. Do they not know that the first drop of red blood on our flag was that of Crispus Attucks, an African American skilled tradesman in Boston who died at the Boston Massacre, which led to our War of Independence? How could they not rise, how could they not respect his sacrifices as one people, united under God...

Old Town Music Hall Tour by Eric Engle

Our tour group met up early Saturday morning, so as to caravan from Huntington Beach, up the Pacific Coast Highway (Hwy I), all the way to El Segundo. Nestled between Manhattan Beach and the Los Angeles International Airport (LAX), the Old Town Music Hall resides in the old El Segundo State Theater, originally built in 1921. Old Town Music Hall began in the 1960s when two musicians, Bill Coffman and Bill Field (The Two Bills), purchased the "Mighty Wurlitzer" Theatre Pipe Organ from the Fox West Theater in Long Beach, CA, and installed it in the quaint El Segundo State Theater. The "Mighty Wurlitzer" is an exceptionally interesting and intriguing marvel! Basically a HUGE pipe organ, it can also be said that it was a precursor to the modern-day "synthesizer", in that not only was it designed to play accompanying music for the silent films, but it could also make a wide array of sound effect for the movies. Our group was treated to just a few of those sound effects during the performance by the organist, Stirling Yearian. Such sounds as, trolley car bells, train horns, slide whistles, sounds of doors closing, percussion instruments like drums, castanets, cymbals,.... It is truly a remarkable piece of engineering from back in the days of silent films!

While the Mighty Wurlitzer was the Crown lewel Centerpiece of the theater, the main performance was by 3 exceptionally gifted pianists, John Reed-Torres, Eve Elliott, and Vincent Johnson, all playing Rag Time tunes from the very early 1900's: Wonderful tunes that kept the audience's toes tapping the whole time. The 3 pianists took turns playing the two grand pianos AND the upright piano nuzzled up against the wall, just a short distance from the grand pianos. Love that Rag Time music!!!! The opening piece was "The Entertainer", written in 1902 by Scott Joplin, most folks know it from "The Sting", staring Robert Redford and Paul Newman. The Entertainer has always been my all time favorite from the first time that I heard it in The Sting. We were also treated to several original compositions from a Mr. Reed-Torres and Mr. Johnson.

A very special "thank you" to all the performers at the Old Time Music Hall. And another "thank you" to our Tour Director, Steve Pavich. Good one, Steve!!



The Dust Bowl...by Diane Gaughen

The continuing story of the making of Route 66

On May 10 and 11, 1934, a dust storm blew 300 million tons of topsoil away from Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Kansas and Colorado. Farming had broken up the topsoil of the prairies, allowing the wind to do its devastation. Thus began the trek of the Okies and the Arkies from Oklahoma and Arkansas to California, resulting in John Steinbeck's great novel, Grapes of Wrath.

Because there was no air conditioning, Moms would hang wet dishtowels in the open windows and over the faces of their children. In the morning, red dirt covered everything. Most days, they couldn't even see the sun, the dust was so thick.

Many people couldn't raise enough crops under these conditions. They sold their land and became tenant farmers. When the dust became overwhelming, they packed up everything they could in their Model A's and headed west.

But some saw an opportunity and built businesses along Route 66 to cater to the needs of the flood of migrants moving west. They built motels and gas stations and grocery stores.

One gas station owner described these migrants as "those people with mattresses on top of their cars". But she said they were honest and would work for a dollar a day to pay for gas that was 12 ½ cents a gallon. The local shop-owners would offer some credit until the folks could pay. Some migrants decided to stay put in New Mexico and became leading citizens. So it wasn't all "Grapes of Wrath".
