Bylaws of the RockFord A's

Rev. 09/11/2025

Article I: RockFord A's

Section 1: The name of this organization is the RockFord A's., hereafter referred to as the Club. Section 2: The Club is a region of the Model A Restorers Club (MARC) and chapter of the Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA).

Article II: Purpose

The RockFord A's Model A Club welcomes members and supporters who value Model A's. Those who own a Model A are encouraged to preserve, exhibit, and make use of their cars in community events. We seek to educate present and future generations. Our aim is to be a people club that is united by Model A's.

Article III: Membership

Section 1: An individual who pays the annual dues is considered a Member, which includes their spouse or significant other. Members of the Club may be anyone who is interested in the Model A Ford car whether they own such a car or not. Members are strongly encouraged to belong to one of the national Model A organizations such as MAFCA, MARC, or MAFFI, the national Model A organizations which represent our Region. An interest in the purpose of the Club and a desire to take an active part in club activities shall be the primary requirement for membership.

Section 2: The dues payable by each member shall be \$20 per calendar year. Dues are payable to the treasurer by January 1st of each year. Each paid membership shall be entitled to one vote at any meeting calling for a vote of the membership. Members who are more than 90 days in arrears (March 31st) shall have their names removed from the Club roster and newsletter distribution. Reinstatement shall occur when yearly dues are paid. Those members who are 85 years old or older are considered lifetime members and are no longer required to pay dues.

Article IV – Meetings:

Section 1: The regular monthly meeting shall be held on the last Tuesday of each month, or any other date as requested by the President, except for the months of January, February, November, and December when other events may take the place of monthly meetings.

Section 2: The annual meeting and election of officers (if appropriate) will be held at the Annual Banquet during the month of November. The purpose of the annual meeting will be to elect officers for the next calendar year and to transact other business which may come before the meeting.

Section 3: Special meetings of the membership may be called by the President, another officer, or not less than 20% of the paid-up members in good standing. Notice of any special meeting must be delivered by regular or email not less than five days before the date and time of the special meeting. The purpose of the special meeting is to be included in the notice of the meeting.

Section 4: A quorum at any meeting of the members shall be not less than 20% of the members in good standing who are qualified to vote at a meeting. If a quorum is not present, a majority of the members present may adjourn the meeting.

Article V – Officers:

Section 1: The elected officers of the Club shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and four Directors. The election of officers shall take place at the annual meeting of the Club in November. The term of office shall run for a period of 2 years unless otherwise stated below. For future elections, the President, Treasurer, and two directors' terms will be for two years. The Vice-President, Secretary, and the other two directors' terms will initially be for one year and then two years thereafter. This procedure will ensure that not all officers and directors will be elected in the same year. In case of a vacancy in one of the offices before the end of the term, the Board of Directors may fill the vacancy by a majority vote.

Section 2: President

The chief executive officer of the Club shall be the President. The President shall supervise and oversee the business and affairs of the Club and shall preside at all meetings of the Club and perform all duties incident to the office of President.

Section 3: Vice-President

The Vice-President shall act in the absence of the president and shall perform the duties normally done by the President.

Section 4: Secretary

The Secretary shall keep minutes of the meetings, provide notice to the members in accordance with the provisions of these bylaws, keep a database of members names, addresses, phone numbers, and email addresses, and in general perform all duties incidental to the office of Secretary.

Section 5: Treasurer

The Treasurer shall have charge and custody of the checkbook, books of account and be responsible for all the bank accounts and funds of the Club. The Treasurer shall provide a report at each regular meeting as to the income, expenses, and cash balance of the Club accounts. All expenditures over \$150 must be approved by the board.

Section 6: Directors

The four elected Directors shall serve as members-at-large, and their function will be to broaden the leadership of the Club by offering additional input and direction.

Section 7: Special Meetings

The President of the Club may periodically call together the Officers and Directors to meet as a board of directors for the purpose of addressing matters of concern to the Club.

Section 8: Volunteer Positions

The Club may have a number of Volunteer position. These could include, but are not limited to:

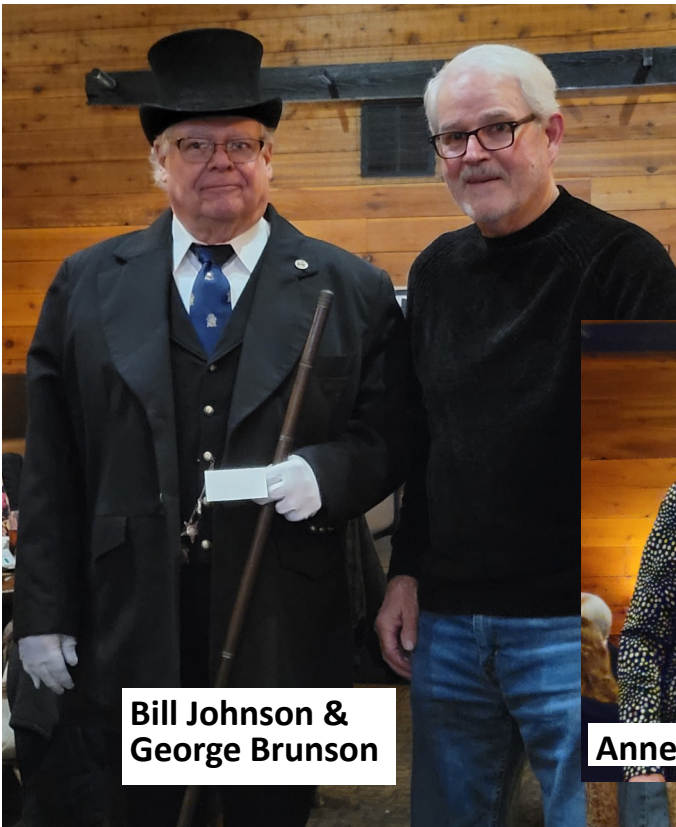

Article VI: Ratification and Amendments to these Bylaws

Section 1: To become effective or to be amended, these Bylaws or amendments must be ratified by a two-thirds majority of the members present and voting at a regular meeting.

Section 2: Adequate notice of any meeting regarding changes to the Bylaws must be given at least five days before any meeting with the intent to alter, amend, repeal, or adopt new Bylaws.

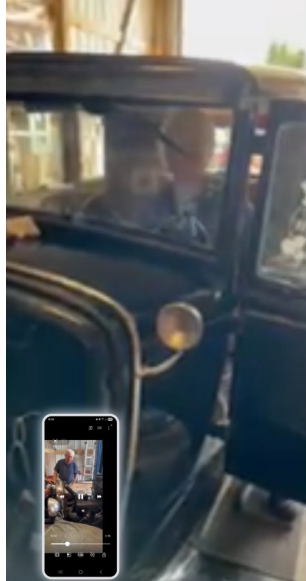

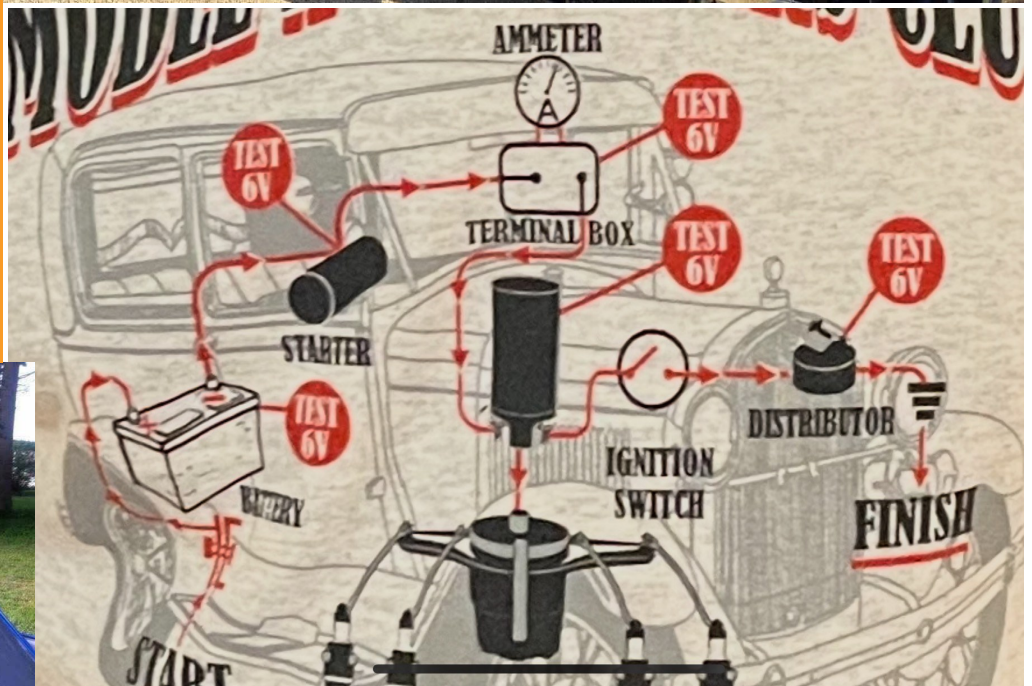

CHILDREN'S WEAR

Children's wear in the 1920s benefited from new technology and research into children's development. Freedom of movement and comfort were prioritized as the layers of previous decades came off and, much like womenswear and menswear, simplicity became key as seen in the simple styles that home-sew patterns offered. Young girls wore simple loose dresses often made in cotton or linen, though velvet, like this coat, was popular for special occasions. The length of the dresses varied by age getting longer as the girls got older. Peter pan collars, smocking, patterned fabrics, and embroidery were all popular in girls' clothing throughout the decade.

Christmas in 1929-1930 was heavily influenced by the start of the Great Depression, meaning most gifts were practical and handmade, like clothes from flour sacks or hand-knitted items. The White House also experienced a major fire in its West Wing during a Christmas party in 1929, but festivities continued with the lighting of the national Yule tree. A notable development was the increased use of electric lights on Christmas trees in 1930.

1929: The year of the White House fire: A major fire broke out in the West Wing during a children's Christmas party. The press room was destroyed, but the party continued and the children were never in danger. National Yule Tree: President Hoover presided over the lighting.

1930: Handmade gifts: With the Great Depression impacting the economy, Christmas gifts were often practical and homemade. Examples include clothing made from flour sacks, hand-knitted socks, or ornaments made from paper, wood, and popcorn.

- **Increased electric lights: 1930 saw more households using electric lights for the first time to decorate their Christmas trees.**
- **Practical gifts: Gifts were often necessities, such as winter coats, dresses, and socks, rather than luxury items.**
- **Food-based gifts: Oranges were a common and special gift because they were a relatively expensive fruit. Other common gifts included fruits, nuts, candy, or soda from local stores.**

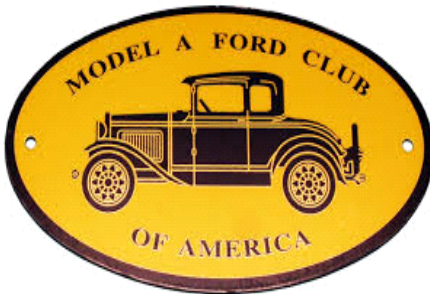

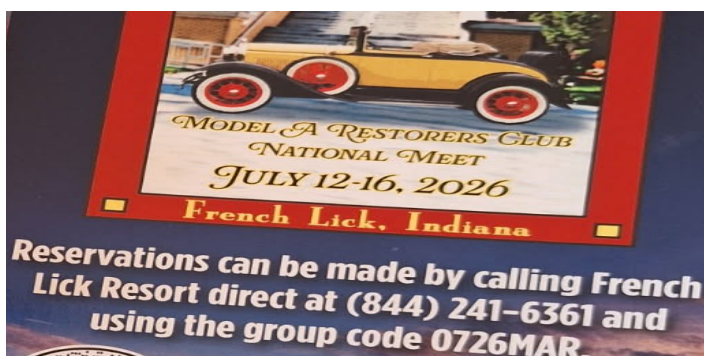

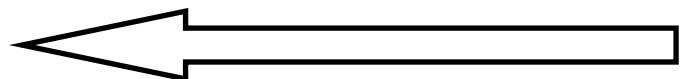
