A Shade Tree Mechanic's Thoughts on Life and Cars: By Wade Ratzlaff, San Fernando Valley Model A Club



William S. Hart – The Cowboy Who Rode Off into the Sunset... in a Model A Ford

When you think of William S. Hart, you probably picture him in blackand-white—broad-brimmed hat, six-shooter at his side, astride a trusty steed. Hart was one of Hollywood's first cowboy stars, a man whose rugged face and quiet dignity made him the Clint Eastwood of the silent film era. But here's the twist—when the cameras stopped rolling, Hart didn't just ride horses. He drove a Ford.

Hart came to California in the 1910s and quickly became the king of Westerns. His films were known for their authenticity—no flashy trick shots or dime-novel nonsense. He was the real deal, and the public loved him for it. By the mid-1920s, Hart had made his fortune, bought himself a ranch in what is now Newhall, and settled into a quieter life.

And then came 1928, the year Ford introduced the Model A. It was modern, stylish, and—compared to the old Model T—just about as luxurious as a cowboy could want without compromising his rugged image. Hart bought one, and it became his go-to ride when the distance was too far for a horse and too close for a train. Imagine it—Hollywood's original cowboy star rumbling down dusty Newhall roads, Stetson tilted back, maybe a saddle tossed in the rumble seat "just in case."

His Model A wasn't just transportation; it was a bridge between two worlds. Hart was a man rooted in the 19th-century West, but he wasn't afraid to embrace 20th-century technology. The Model A fit him perfectly—simple, dependable, and ready for anything, much like the man himself.

Today, if you visit the William S. Hart Park and Museum in Newhall, you can still get a sense of the man who helped shape America's idea of the Old West. You'll see his home, his cowboy gear, and maybe even hear a story or two about that Model A. Because while Hart may have been famous for riding into the sunset, he also knew there were times when four wheels beat four legs—especially if those wheels belonged to a Ford.

So the next time you fire up your own Model A, tip your hat to Wil-

liam S. Hart, the cowboy who could handle a horse, a Hollywood set, or a winding California road—no problem.


From where I sit...


For the past few years it has been like pulling teeth to


Henry Ford Story

Learning The Trade

Henry Ford started young. By the age of 12, he was spending most of his spare time in a small machine shop, which he had equipped himself. It was here that he constructed his first steam engine, in 1878, aged just 15. The next year, Henry left home, bound for the nearby city of Detroit, to work as an apprentice machinist.

By 1891, he had become an engineer with the Edison Illuminating Company in Detroit. A promotion to Chief Engineer two years later, gave him enough time and money to devote more attention to his personal experiments on internal combustion engines.

The culmination of his experiments was the building of a self-propelled vehicle – the Quadricycle – in 1896. The first Ford engine spluttered its way into history, on his wooden kitchen table at 58 Bagley Avenue and this was quickly followed by his next design, an engine mounted on a frame, fitted with four bicycle wheels – the first Ford car.



Keep Brake Linings Clean



Recently, I replaced my brake drums and brake linings. In the past, I have always had trouble keeping oil and/or grease from getting on the brake linings. This time I covered the linings with 2" blue masking tape.

I just simply left the tape on the linings until after I finished assembling all the springs and miscellaneous parts. I removed the tape as the brake drums were installed. This worked fantastic!

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SFV Chapter MAFCA General Meeting Minutes September, 2025



Treasurer Hunter reported that the club is still solvent and spoke about the dues that






V.P. Wade displayed a vast array of apparel that is (or will be) available. Wade then talked a bit about the A-Team and some past and some upcoming projects.




