

Jim's Tech Tips – "Check Your Rear Axle Nuts"

Every time I have a rear wheel off a Model A, I use the opportunity to check the tightness of the rear axle nut for that wheel. They are supposed to he quite tight, and yet I find many with at least one axle nut that is loose. This is not good. If the hub is able to move on the axle, it will cause excess wear to the end of the axle and can damage it to the point where the axle will need to be replaced.



To check it, first remove the cotter key. With the transmission in 1st or Reverse gear, and the opposite rear tyre on the ground, you can apply a wrench to the axle and confirm it is tight.

Ford did not publish torque values for nuts and bolts; he counted on the experience and "feel" of expert mechanics to know how tight to make things. Les Andrews has a value of 125 ft-lbs in his book for this nut, and I feel that is a good target to shoot for. Watch the position of the cotter pin hole relative to the slots in the axle nut. If the pin will not line up on the nut, keep tightening the nut until the cotter pin goes in. Bend the ears over. I use a new cotter pin every time.

The simple maintenance step will help you avoid bigger problems down the road.

The following is a write-up from John himself.

As a recent recipient of a 50-year membership of the club I have been asked to give my thoughts on reaching this milestone, it makes me realise yet again age is rapidly catching up with me.

Mary and I joined the Club only a few years after its beginning when our weekly meeting place was the old schoolhouse at MOTAT, later in the theatre under the old aviation pavilion.

Most of us back then were of a similar age some newly married, some with young families, others single so Club activities tended to reflect the mix.



I recall some amazing Xmas parties when we laid down a hangi at a club members property complete with a keg of beer - we don't see that anymore. Too many stories to be told.

Most of us were in the process of restoring a Model A or two, not so much the case today, and there wasn't access to parts suppliers we now have locally and overseas. Tyres could be bought from your local Firestone dealer and were made in NZ.

Some Ford dealers still carried some basic genuine Ford parts, but swap meets held everywhere, were the main source for obtaining needed parts. Pukekohe Swap Meet was the standout for most of us sadly now gone rebuilding engines and mechanicals were strictly as Henry had made them.

Looking back, I have owned nine roadworthy Model A's, restored five from scratch and owned numerous rolling chassis and parts. The only New Zealand body style I have not owned is a 1930 Coupe.

Mary and I have attended several National Meets - the first one in Blenheim in 1989 hosted by the Canterbury chapter of the Model A Restorers Club USA.

Over the years we have been involved in all aspects of the Club and held each executive position at one time or another including helping with National and other events hosted by our club.


Many good friends have been made through our association with the Club and sadly a number have since passed on.

TWO TOOTH STEERING BASICS

Simple once known



The Ford Model A two tooth steering system is designed to be adjustable to compensate for wear. There are three adjustments to the two tooth steering system that can be made with the steering column in the car. They are: **1.** End play in the two tooth sector. **2.** End play in the steering shaft, and **3.** proper mesh of the two tooth sector in the worm gear. The Model A Ford Service Manual recommends "When it is necessary to make one of these adjustments, the other two adjustments should also be checked". Make all adjustments in the order listed above.

4. Centralizing the Sector to the Worm

In most cases the above adjusting procedure will remove the slop in the steering system. If not, it may be necessary to pull the steering column and do a fourth adjustment. The fourth adjustment is usually preformed after a rebuild of the steering box. The fourth adjustment centralizes the contact of the **Two Tooth Sector** with the **Worm Gear**. Once centralized the third adjustment can be repeated, thus, improving the mesh between the two.



If there is less lash when the steering shaft is turned to the left, slightly move eccentric rivet in a clockwise direction.

If the lash is less when the steering shaft is turned to the right, slightly move eccentric rivet in an anticlockwise direction.

Repeat steps A-D in this process until the amount of lash on both sides feel equal.





SPEAKING FASHION - Vacations often meant the seashore and leisure clothes

It could be a pleasant day in light silk pyjamas and a broadbrimmed straw hat, a light sleeveless dress, or a not-socomfortable wool bathing suit. Both men and women wore one-piece suits, some with belts. The women's usually had some type of skirt, even if only an inch or two longer than the seat. Arms and legs were bare of course; long gone were the bloomers and sleeved suits. Men's suits were similar to the women's, without the skirt of course, and many had a large round hole beneath the armhole. Bathing caps and slippers made of rubber were worn in the water, almost always by women and often by men. The caps could look like the usual cloche, though most resembled closely the bathing caps of today with a chin strap held by snaps or button closures. Parasols were often carried and large beach umbrellas were planted in the sand. Camping clothes could be wide legged trousers, with midi type top, or knee length shorts of the '30's (see illustrations). Often, just a cotton dress was worn of the 'house dress' variety. Oxfords were worn and yes, often a hat.

Horseback riders usually wore 'jodhpurs', with man-styled jackets and shirts, a riding cap, which resembled a jockey's cap, or a small brimmed Derby, oxfords and leggings, or knee-high boots. A quirt (small leather whip) was often carried, though I'm sure more for style than to use on the horse. Men wore 'jodhpurs' too, or they could get away with their knickers as well for casual ride.

Our illustrations show some sporty pyjamas and a cool summer dress. As you can see, a scarf could be wound around the head, rather than wearing a hat. They are very comfortable to model (except possibly for the bathing suits).

You may wonder what accessories would be used with these outfits. With the swim suits a large rubber ball would be nice, but nothing would really be necessary. With the pyjamas, a straw purse would be appropriate or a small compact. Teddy's were worn under these pyjamas and often silk seamed hosiery.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH – Tony Mannington's Bacon Butties

These bacon butties were served for breakfast at Tony and Pam's prior to our departure for home. I have to say they were delicious and well worth making. Give it a go, you won't regret it.

INGREDIENTS:

1 loaf sliced white bread.

HP Sauce

850 grams sliced streaky bacon

20 slices tasty cheddar slices.

METHOD:

Trim crusts from sides of bread.

Smear each slice with HP Sauce.

Place slice of cheese on bread and roll up from crust end.

Wrap a slice of streaky bacon around roll.

Should be able to roll around bread from one end of roll to the other.

Line a large tray with baking paper and place bacon rolls on tray.

Bake in 180 degree oven for approx half an hour until bacon crispy.

Enjoy.

Bread is easier to roll if you flatten with a rolling pin or the palm of your hand.


