In a recent issue of the Beehive As newsletter, the Editor and prominent Ford




historian, Henry Dominguez posted this photo of Henry and Edsel Ford with the 20,000,00 Ford and Henry's Quadracycle.

He included this explanation: "You have probably seen quite a few photographs over the years of the 20 Millionth Ford, a 1931 Model **A** Ford Fordor sedan. But you

probably haven't seen the famous car in this scene. Edsel Ford (left) and Henry Ford are posing with the

milestone Model A, along with Henry's first car, the Quadricycle, at Henry's estate, Fairlane. The Model A came off the assembly line in April 1931, and that is why the trees are barren. Shortly



after this photograph was taken, the Model **A** was driven to every state capital in the country as a publicity tour. It visited Salt Lake City on September 1, 1931. He also posted this photo (left) of the log book kept by Ford showing their visit to Salt Lake City.

I noted with interest the last two lines on that page show they visited American Fork. I wondered if they visited other Utah Valley cities and then on to St George, or if they followed the Lincoln Highway on to California. Henry provided me with these additional pages (included below) from the log book showing they visited American Fork, Provo, Payson, Nephi, Filmore, Beaver, Cedar City, St George, and Zion and Bryce National Parks through Central and Southern Utah from

2 Sep 1931 to 7 Sep 1931 and then on to the West. I used that information to map their route

in Google Maps (right) which roughly follows today's I-15. I can only imagine the fun, exhilaration, adrenaline, and even fear as they passed through these sparsely populated areas. What a blast it would have been. We may not be able to have the same experience but we can have experiences just as exhilarating when traveling with our Model As. Happy Driving!



The Salty A's also mentioned the Draper Parade on July 19th, where they asked our club to help give under-privileged kids rides in our cars during the parade.










private resort owned by one of Bill's relatives so we had the whole place to ourselves.

Recipe of the Month Cream Puffs w/ Custard Filling From Better Homes & Gardens (1941-1950)

Ingredients (Cream Puffs):

¹/₂ cup butter
1 cup boiling water
1 cup flour
¹/₄ teaspoon salt
4 eggs



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Directions (Cream Puffs):

1. Melt butter in water. Add flour and salt all at once and stir vigorously; cook, stirring constantly, until mixture forms a ball that does not separate. Remove from heat and cool slightly.

Add eggs one at a time, beating vigorously after each addition until mixture is smooth.
 Drop from tablespoon 2 inches apart onto greased baking sheet. Bake in hot oven (450°) 15 minutes, then moderate oven (325°) 25 minutes.


4. Remove with spatula and cool on rack. When thoroughly cool, cut side of each puff and fill with Cornstarch Custard (recipe below), pudding, or whipped cream. Makes 1 dozen Cream Puffs.

Ingredients (Custard):


3 tablespoons cornstarch 1/3 cup sugar 1/8 teaspoon salt ½ cup of cold milk 2½ cups of scalded milk 1 teaspoon vanilla

Directions (Custard):


- 1. Mix cornstarch, sugar and salt; combine with cold milk
- 2. Gradually add hot milk.
- 3. Cook in double boiler, stirring until thick; cover and cook 15 to 20 minutes.
- 4. Add vanilla. Pour into molds, rinsed with cold water; chill until firm.




Period Fashion From MAFCA Restorer Magazine – May 2023

A Backward Interest in Design By Lynda Davis, Dallas and Fort Worth Model A Clubs

In their 1928 winter magazine, the Fifth Avenue luxury department store 8. Altman and Company describes evolving fashion trends as the "playful imagination of fashion [that] is constantly conceiving delightfully fanciful things, some of which live while others wither and die. How frivolous one can feel in billows of tulle and chiffon-in a youthful bouffant frock, . . . or, when dining and dancing in crowded spaces, how smart the sophisticate appears in an evening gown of more restraint-one that falls in straighter, softer lines and follows the body rather [definitively]." Altman's observation aptly reflects the evolution of style during the 1920-30 decade.

The decade dawned with women's voting rights and freedoms (leading to shorter dress hems) and ended with the cataclysmic crash of a booming economy (in which hem length dropped along with stocks). B. Altman's statement marks the fashion-pendulum swing from the frilly garden party and elaborate and beaded flapper dresses (with hem lines reaching their height in 1927 to just below the knee), to the advancing trend towards more conservatively-styled, longer and sleeker gowns "of more restraint," what Altman called the "'straightening out' feeling." These dresses were typically made from velvet, heavy silk, silk crepe de Chine, silk pongee, lace, and the new Rayon, and they hug the body in ways that Jean Harlow would later make famous.

The most interesting notation in Altman's magazine describes a "decided back-ward interest in formal gowns." These gowns frequently have a front that appears "quite plain"; however, when "backs are turned ethically, bodices and waistlines are found to be attractively elaborated" with "stressand often strass [rhinestone adornments]-on many a low decollete" (sic). Just a few years earlier, shorter hemlines exposed women's legs, increasing hosiery sales and making ladies' legs an area of interest. As fashion approached the 1930s, hemlines dropped to the mid-calf and longer, shifting emphasis from the legs to the back, and often those backs were bared to the waist.

The likely reason for displacing the focus to the dress-back may have something to do with dancing. With shorter dress hems, women had free range of movement, enabling them to enjoy dances such as the Charleston. But with longer dress lengths, inhibited movement likely encouraged slower dancing, "cheek to cheek." Altman's magazine speculates that it is from behind that the "sophisticate" is better able to show off her formal evening dress when "dancing in crowded spaces."

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
Of course, bobbed hair and bared backs do provide nice landscapes for ladies to show off their jewelry. How often have we heard tales of our grandmothers or great grandmothers wearing their long necklaces backwards down their lovely backs. To illustrate a bit

of strass, as Altman puts it, look to the 1931 illustration above left and to MAFCA member Tammie Jones below. Here the fashionable models wear rhinestone clips at their back décolleté. Then, too, capitalizing on the desire to accentuate the feminine back, manufacturers produced and sold "backdrop" necklaces especially for that purpose. Backdrop (sometimes spelled "back-drop") necklaces, like traditional necklaces, decorate the neck-front and



fasten in the back; however, the "backdrop feature," as seen in the figures above and the photo of Myrna Loy at the right, typically sport two or three strands that "drop" down below the coiffed hair-bun at the neck's nape and dangle between the shoulder blades. Model A Era fashions prove to be beautiful when women are both coming and going. The women of our era really knew how to make an exit!

From the Scrapbook of the late Gwen Gerber Dockstader



The distinctive Model A Ford De Luxe Phaeton was introduced in June 1930. Unlike the (standard) Phaeton, the De Luxe Phaeton was a two-door model with a single wide door providing access to both the front and rear seats. This low-production automobile was a very desirable Model A body style. It featured high sides, low seats and a very sporty appearance – while easily accommodating four passengers. While only one interior trim scheme was used, the De Luxe Phaeton was available in a wide variety of exterior color combinations.



A Note on Authenticity

Last year, I visited long-time club member Karl Pope to do a lube job on his beautiful 28 Roadster. While there I noticed his distributor body had a Ford script logo on it. I thought wow, this must be quite a find. I've never seen one of these before.

I mustered the courage to ask if I could change another club member's car that was probably not a smart thing to do, eh? I asked Karl if he might be

willing to swap one of my newer reproduction distributor bodies so I

could put that original body with the Ford script on my 29 Fordor—certainly an unwise thing to ask. He was so kind and said he would be willing to trade. I was ready to run home to get that body off my car to bring it back and swap it.

Having learned the hard way to not acquire original parts unless I had done my homework, I decided I should check out the Restoration Guidelines and Judging Standards. Page 2-11 says, "In July 1931 a



29

Ford script was added to the distributor body between the number I and 2 contact points. In August 1931 "U.S.A." was added below the Ford script." I interpret that to mean that there was no script on cars before July 1931.

Elaine Carlson Passing


July 18,1948 to May 31, 2025


