MARC-MILEAGE PROGRAM GUIDELINES

By Bruce Adams

Purpose:

The purpose of the MARC Mileage Program is to offer national recognition for all miles driven in a Model A Ford. There is no intent to supersede or cancel any regional or local driving programs now in existence. The program seeks to further them by offering a mileage-based recognition for all registered MARC vehicles.

General:

- 1) All Model A's owned by MARC members and registered in the MARC Mileage Program, and which meet the following standards, are eligible.
- 2) Of original manufacture from 1927 through 1931.
- 3) Titled or registered as a Model A in accordance with respective state requirements.
- 4) Authentic in overall appearance, with a minimum of the following basic features:
 - A) Original Ford four-cylinder engine produced from 1927 through 1934
 - B) Body style for year of manufacture.

Rules For Miles Driven:

- 1) All ground mileage is credited, except for non-emergency tow.
- 2) All credited mileage is cumulative from year to year and to each higher award level.
- 3) Mileage to be credited must be attested.
- No mileage is credited for any period of time that the owner is not a member of the Model A Restorers Club.
- 5) Mileage does not have to be updated every year to maintain eligibility.
- 6) Mileage is accumulated through the reporting of the odometer reading as of December 31st of each year.
- 7) The MARC Mileage Program Chairman is the final authority on mileage credit and awards.

National Awards:

- 1) Award recognition begins at 2,000 miles; the second award level is 5,000 miles and subsequent levels are each 5,000 miles thereafter.
- A round blue plaque is awarded with the first mileage level, and a replacement mileage tab is awarded thereafter.

Registration:

A fee of \$1.00 is required at the time or vehicle registration. MARC shall maintain the original registration form as a permanent

record for each vehicle registered in the program. A Vehicle transferred to a new MARC member who re-registers the car may, if the new owner wishes, maintain it's mileage award level and continue eligibility for further awards in accordance with the rules.

How Fortunate Are We?

A review of the club's roster of Past Club Presidents reveals an interesting account of dedication to service to our club.

Our FIRST 2-year term president was Bill Evans (1959-1960) - one of our founding members. For the following next 13 years, we had a parade of one year term presidents until Cliff Moebius came along and was the SECOND 2-year term (1974-1975) president.

There were no 2-year term leaders for the next 7 years until Ron Ridolph (1983-1984) started a trend of 2-year terms. That sort of became the "norm" with the next nine following presidents (Frank Ziegler, Ray Leblond, Walter Hawkins, Tom Lopez, George Mahler, Tom Catania, Frank Giannone, Lois Ziegler - the FIRST female president, and Janice Slott) all serving a 2-year term until....

In 2003 Tom Lopez started the FIRST 3-year (2003 – 2005) term and set a record as the only Five-year term president. His 3-year "norm" was followed by Angela Adler (2008 -2010) and Jerry Lehecka (2015-2017) with a single 2-year term by Walter Blessing (2006-2007) in between.

The 3-year term "norm" was short lived when it was broken by Peter Osmanski becoming the FIRST 4-year term (2011-2014) president followed by Jon Reiff (2018-2021) and Ray Leblond (2022-2025).

Ray's 4-year term - while continuing the 4-year "norm" - shattered the prior 5-year service record and established a new record as the only Six-year term president.

Again, how fortunate are we to have members step up to serve the club and keep it going. With election season approaching in the Fall, all members should consider becoming part of this special club within a club and have their name and accomplishments preserved in the history of The Model A Ford Club of Long Island.



Distributor Cap Mod

- Lets you see sparking at rotorShould be purple / blue sparks
- Use clear distributor cap




Use as a tool, not for touring

Modify a stock distributor cap

Cutaway & discard both sides of distributor cap



Smooth cut edges & overcoat with clear paint or nail polish

Distributor – Wire Between The Plates

- Too stiff & rubs against distributor casting
- Short circuits intermittent or no ignition
- Replace with silicone jacketed
 14 Gage stranded wire
 - Available in hobby shops for radio controlled cars
 - Solder both end terminals

Floorboard Heat Reflector

- Reflects heat radiating from muffler
- Add bare aluminum flashing material to passenger's side
- Shiniest side towards muffler
- Attach with plated tacks or staples



Floorboard Mod - Transmission Fill Plug Access

- Make cardboard template of battery access cutout
- Locate template over transmission fill plug & parallel to iron bracket on floorboard




Flow Testing the Zenith Model "A" Carburetor

Over this past winter, in search of an at home in house project in a nice warm place, I decided to explore how the Zenith Model "A" carburetor actually works, mainly because my Model A gets what I consider to be terrible gas mileage. I think my engine runs fairly well. The ignition is good and compression as well. I don't think these cars were designed to get very good gas mileage but if things are not right with the carburetor, it will never do well. So, after reading a few articles about these carburetors, I decided to find out more about how they work. Let's jump right into the Zenith Carburetor. Unlike more modern carburetors which have accelerator pumps and needle valves that lift up as the throttle is opened, like the 4-barrel Quadrajet on my 1969 Pontiac Grand Prix, these Zenith carbs are a very simple design with few moving parts and adjustments. The genius of the Zenith carburetor is that it maintains a constant air fuel ratio over its entire operating range. The Zenith Carburetor was invented by a Frenchman, Mr. François Baverey in 1905. The design maintains a fuel to air ratio of 14.6: 1, which means that for every 14.6 grams of air it mixes with 1 gram of gasoline. This is the stoichiometric value for gasoline. The Zenith carburetor accomplishes this with four stationery jets. Each of these jets operates at the different rates of air flow coming into the carburetor as the throttle plate is opened up and the engine speed increases. The four jets do not work at the same time but come into play as the airspeed/velocity increases. At idle, the throttle plate is fully closed or at least it should be. Gasoline is supplied by the idle jet which sits in the secondary well where it picks up gas and is mixed with air and sent to the idle port, which sits right above the throttle butterfly. If the flow rate is accurate for this jet (between 44 to 48 milliliters/minute) the air adjustment screw will be able to mix the correct amount of air into the gasoline and the car will idle properly. Once the throttle is opened a little, the idle jet ceases to operate and the fuel is metered out by the combination of the compensator jet, cap jet and is aided by the gav adjustment if necessary. These operate in the middle range, where the car is moving along at around 30 to 35 mph. At higher speeds, the main jet takes over and supplies the proper amount of fuel. The other jets are now out of the circuit and cease to operate.

See schematic diagram below of the Zenith Carburetor for jets, etc.



So how do you know if the carburetor is working properly? Unless you install a wideband oxygen sensor in the exhaust pipe right before the muffler coupled to a gauge that is designed to measure the air/fuel ratio, you won't know. There are signs, like crappy gas mileage, the car doesn't pull properly and spark plugs are fouled up with a lot of black carbon. The traditional way to know how well your carburetor is working is to measure the flow rates of all the jets and compare the flow rates to a chart that was designed by Ford and used by the Model A car community. Okay by now you may be asking yourself, how do I measure the flow rates of each jet. It is actually pretty simple. It requires a column of water that is 36 inches tall. You need to maintain the column of water at 36 inches at all times and this will produce the proper pressure to check the flow rates of each of the four jets. At this point, you may be asking yourself, if they don't match up to what the flow rates should be. What do you do? Answer: You can buy new jets, which may or may not be accurate (Snyder's Jets are pretty good), However, you can also fix the old jets. If they flow too much, they need to be soldered closed and then re-drilled to the proper opening using very small drill bits. Note, these drills can easily be broken. So be careful. I was a little concerned but was able to do it without breaking any drill bits. Be patient and you will be okay




Image of flow tester above.

I got a little fancy with this thing but a simple 36" long pipe with the water maintained in the pipe will do as well. The other thing that you need to pay attention to are the passages and the secondary well. If any of these are blocked with rust or dirt, you are going to have a problem. Clean out the passages and incidentally you don't have to drill out the brass plugs to do that. Just use a paper clip and some compressed air and you should be able to clean everything. I cleaned my carburetor bodies using electrolysis. I use electrolysis to clean everything, including engine blocks, car wheels etc. Everything that rusts can and should be cleaned using electrolysis.

I recommend buying the carburetor book, Zenith Model "A" Carburetor Restoration Guidelines by Steven Pargeter. It is an easy read and will give you all the information that you need to become a carburetor expert. Buy the book.

Ford Radiators

The Ford Motor Company manufactured radiators and heater cores from 1923 to November 30th, 1988 when the Green Island branch in Troy, New York, was Construction of the factory and its own hydroelectric power plant began in 1921. The 45-acre site stretched for a quarter of a mile parallel to the Hudson River. Radiators for the Model T were produced there. Henry Ford chose the site because he wanted to provide work for farmers in the winter. The radiator plant employed over one thousand men. The plant was closed in 1988 when they changed from copper to aluminum radiators and heater cores which were then being produced cheaper in Michigan. Ford sold the property to the city in 1999 for one dollar. The cleared for industrial area was a new development. The hydroelectric station was taken over by the Green Island Power Authority. In 2004, the salvaged steel from the razing of the radiator plant almost paid for the cost of demolition.







WHAT WINDSHIELD WIPER DO I NEED

FOR MY MODEL A? BY TOM JEANES



ELECTRIC WIPERS were standard equipment on all closed Model A's from the beginning of production in October 1927 and on all models at the beginning of 1929. These were supplied by Owen-Dyneto Corporation through November 1928, with Heinze Electric Company beginning to supply wipers in December 1928 and E.A. Labs beginning to supply wipers in April 1929.

CLOSED CARS used an appropriate electric wiper while open cars specifically used O-D electric wipers. Electric wipers were eliminated by June 1930.

All of these wipers were made with pot metal (zinc housing) and were prone to breakage over time. Finding an intact electric wiper is often difficult, and finding an operating wiper even more so. As a result, they can be quite costly.

Some efforts have been made to recast the base plates on these wipers due to breakage of the ears or mounting base, but they hard to find. Many of the covers and gears have survived, especially those made of steel or brass (Heinze and EA).

ORIGINAL HARDWARE is difficult to find, but some aftermarket items can be found that are good. Before you go looking, know what you need for your specific vehicle. For example, Heinze provided three models: HATC1 (chrome-plated) and HA-C1 and HA-C2 (black enamel covers).

By mid 1930, Trico became the supplier of all vacuum wipers for Model A Fords. All Ford wipers had a front cover secured by two small, round screws. Trico wipers made for Ford had waffle pattern tops or plain





tops attached to the body with special flat-sided screws.

The most common wipers were the TR-C1A (black) and TR-C1B (chrome) used on most closed cars except those that needed a different configuration for proper

mounting.

Fordors (160-A, -B, -C), Passenger buses and Standrive commercial vehicles (315-A and 330-A), Cabriolet (68-C), Convertible Sedan (400-A), and Victoria (190-A) used a TR-C2A (black) and TR-C2-B (chrome), which had a long drive shaft to facilitate mounting inside the vehicle,

had a waffle top, and had no mounting ears.

Open cab models used TR-O1A (black) or TR-01B (chrome) or TR-01C (black) depending on the configuration requirements.

Trico supplied replacement wipers well past the Model A Era. The replacement number was printed on the cover.

These replacements are functionally the same, but they do not have the cover plate affixed to the body with screws. This deficiency can be overcome by drilling two holes through the cover, drilling and tapping the support posts on the body, and affixing the cover with a pair of 4-36 round head screws.

Replacement wipers were manufactured by Trico with number designations stamped on the wiper body. These were: TR-C1-A (RCX-1), TR-C1B (RCX-7), TR-C2A (RSB-134 or RSB-177), TR-C2B (RSB-174), TR-01A-C (RSL-166, -123 and -104). K-design wipers were introduced in 1932 and replaced the R-design wipers with the same number designation.

THE MOST IMPORTANT thing when you go shopping is to know exactly what you need. If unsure, take a picture of the item in the Model A Restoration Guidelines & Judging Standards.
