Message from the Board

WHO KNEW?

The year is winding down fast! By the time of our next meeting, the month will be almost half over! Then Halloween, then Thanksgiving, then Christmas!

But we still have things to do in the club. For example, we are planning a tour to the local and long-time attraction, Chrystal Hot Springs, in November.

Long before written history, the valley surrounding Crystal Hot Springs was home to more than 450 generations of Native Americans. According to Dr. Steve Simms, Professor of Anthropology and Archaeology at Utah State University, this sacred site was a gathering place for the North Shoshone-Bannock people, who returned each year to celebrate, share stories, and honor their ancestors.

When Chinese railroad workers arrived in the 19th century, they followed the natives' example—building cedar tubs to soak in the mineral-rich waters after grueling days of labor. Later came pioneers, including Abraham Hunsaker, a beekeeper and farmer who founded the nearby town of Honeyville and served as its first mayor.

The springs entered the modern era in 1901, when they became a business known as Madsen Hot Springs. The first pool, gravity-fed and enclosed, welcomed visitors—many of whom rented their swimsuits upon arrival. After a lightning strike destroyed the original bathhouse in 1937, a new lodge was built.

During World War II, the springs became a sanctuary of healing. Under a program initiated by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, hundreds of buses brought wounded soldiers to Crystal Hot Springs, where the soothing waters aided in their recovery.

Roosevelt, who had polio, would do the same thing at Warm Springs, Georgia. His good friend, Edsel Ford, contributed significantly to the up-keep of that facility.

We will not be going the springs specifically to enjoy the warm waters, but we'll end up there after taking an enjoyable tour. The exact route is still being worked out.

A VISIT TO THE FABULOUS GILMORE AUTOMOBILE MUSEUM

Dennis and Jeri Thompson had long dreamed of visiting the Model A Ford Museum at the Gilmore Car Museum in Hickory Corners, Michigan. Their patience and anticipation were finally rewarded on the day of the grand opening of Phase Two of the Model A expansion. It was a journey both personal and historic — a day to remember.

The drive into rural Barry County, near Kalamazoo, carried with it a sense of pilgrimage. The Gilmore Car Museum is situated at Hickory Corners, Michigan, a small community on the west side of the state, on a 90-acre historic campus that hosts a rich automotive heritage. The Thompsons arrived just in time to witness the ribbon cut on the new wing of the Model A Museum, officially marking Phase Two's completion.

They had wanted to make this trip for years — to see in person the largest public museum in the world devoted solely to the Ford Model A. As the doors swung open on this new portion of the exhibit, they felt a mixture of excitement and reverence.

The Gilmore Car Museum is widely regarded as North America's largest automotive museum complex. It features over 400 vintage and collector vehicles across multiple themed buildings, and one of those buildings is dedicated solely to the Model A Ford. Before the expansion, it was the largest display of Model A's in the world, but Phase Two added over 8,000 square feet to the exhibit, allowing for expanded storytelling, vehicle displays, artifacts, and interpretive space.

Dennis and Jeri walked the new wing slowly, pausing by restored sedans, roadsters, delivery trucks, and spareparts displays. The expanded gallery offered more room to breathe, better lighting, richer interpretive panels, and more context about how the Model A shaped American life in the late 1920s and early 1930s. Across the museum, they glimpsed not just cars, but the stories of families, of innovation, and of a changing nation.

When the day wound down, Dennis and Jeri lingered at the edge of the Gilmore Museum, taking in the autumn light over car silhouettes, feeling gratitude that a long-held aspiration had finally come true. The Model A Museum's Phase Two opening was not just an expansion of walls — it was a fulfillment of dreams for visitors like them, ensuring the legacy of the Model A would be preserved with even greater care and impact for generations to come.

THE VERNAL TO EVANSTON TOUR

The Utah Valley Model A Club and the Beehive As recently teamed up for a scenic tour from Vernal to Evanston—a journey filled with history, fellowship, and flawless motoring. Representing the Beehive As were Dennis and Jeri Thompson, the only members from our club to make the trip.

A total of five Model As took part, meeting first in Heber City before heading east to Vernal for an overnight stay. The next day, the group continued toward Evanston, pausing in Fort Bridger for a memorable photo stop at a row of 1929 roadside cabins along the old Lincoln Highway. The owners graciously allowed the cars to park inside the cabins' garages—re-creating a scene straight out of the Model A era.

In Evanston, the travelers toured the historic Union Pacific Railroad yards and roundhouse before parting ways. The Thompsons returned via I-80, while others continued south through Mirror Lake. Altogether, the vintage Fords covered 500 miles without a hitch.
