Visit the DFW Car & Toy Museum July 26, 9:00 AM

Saturday, July 26th we are arranging a club visit to the DFW Car and Toy Museum. Afterwards we would head to Sammie's BBQ for lunch. Members can meet Saturday morning at the museum at 9am and visit for 2 to 3 hours and then head to lunch for those who are interested. The museum is free admission and parking is free in front or to the south side of the museum. The directions below are for Modern cars on the freeways not Model A's, If you are driving your Model "A" Use Google Maps to determine the best surface street travel to get to he museum at 2550 McMillian Parkway.

- Coming from the south and headed north on I-35W exit no. 564 to Meacham, and from the frontage road headed toward Meacham turn right on McMillan Parkway and museum entrance is on your right.
- Coming on North Loop 820 headed west toward I-35W exit no.18 to Beach, turn left or south on Beach, and head to Meacham, turn right or west on Meacham to Sylvania, Left or south on Sylvania to McMillan Parkway, Turn right on the Parkway headed to I-35W service road and just before the service road make a loop to south parkway and enter the museum parking lot.
- Coming from the north on I-35W headed south, exit Meacham, exit 56 onto the frontage road south to Meacham. Turn left or east on Meacham, go under I-35W to Sylvania, turn right or south on Sylvania and go to McMillan Parkway, Turn right to the parkway headed to I-35W service road and make a loop to south parkway just before the service road and enter the museum parking lot.
- From the museum to get to Sammie's, 3801 E. Belknap (US 377), there are several routes'. Most direct would be to leave the museum and head east on the parkway to Sylvania, turn right or south on Sylvania and go to Long Ave, turn left on Long Ave. and go to Beach, turn right or south on Beach to Belknap, turn right or west on Belknap and Sammie's is about two blocks on your right.


2025 Texas Tour – Giddings Texas

SOME INTERESTING FACTS ABOUT THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

1. The Declaration of Independence wasn't signed on July 4, 19776. On July 4, Congress officially adopted the Declaration of Independence, now known as Independence Day. Most of the delegates signed on August 2 and some even later!

2. When the Declaration of Independence was read aloud in New York City, it started a riot. George Washington read the document aloud in front of City Hall. A lively crowd cheered, and later tore down a statue of George III.

3. Eight of the 56 signers of the Declaration of Independence were born in Britain. While the majority of members of the Second Continental Congress were born in America, eight of the men voting for independence from Britain were born there.

4. One signer recanted Richard Stockton, a lawyer from Princeton, New Jersey, was the only signer to recant but only after he was arrested by the British and subjected to harsh treatment while in custody.

5. The Declaration of Independence spent World War II in Fort Knox. On December 23, 1941 the signed Declaration and the Constitution, were removed from public display prepared for evacuation out of Washington, D.C. under the superior or armed guards.

6. Independence Day should have been July 2. July 2, 1776, is the day that the Continental Congress actually voted for independence.

7. Who first signed the Declaration of Independence? John Hancock with this enormous signature, was the first to sign because he was the President of the Congress.

8. Who wrote it? Thomas Jefferson was said to have written the first draft, but the "Committee of Five" actually drafted it, including: Jefferson, Benjamin Franklin, John Livingston, John Adams and Robert Sherman.

9. One man who drafted the Declaration never signed it. John Livingston, one of the five drafters, was recalled by his home state of New York before he could sign it. He did manage to send his cousin Phillip to sign in his place.

10. There is something written on the back. There isn't a treasure map on the back, like in the movies. What is written: *Printed in China*, no, no, no... "Original Declaration of Independence, 4th July 1776".

Shoes and Accessories of the ModelA <u>Er</u>a

Development of affordable man-made materials and mass production during the 1920's made beautiful clothes and shoes available to everyone. The most popular shoe of the late 1920's for women was a single-bar pump with a pointed toe, high-waisted heel, and one button. Other popular styles included T-straps, high tongued, cutaway decorated, and crossovers. Shoe materials used in the 1920's included bright fabrics, dyed leather, and metallic. Also luxury materials such as satins, silks, velvets were used, and they often were accented with overstitching, embroidery, and beading. Heels were made of materials such as Wedgewood, Bakelite, Jasperware, and leather. In the late 1920's the two-toned spectator for men emerged. This looked great with knickers. The early 1930's were much the same as the late 1920's for shoe design. The Art Deco movement did influence shoe styles early in the 1930's decade with its bold geometric look. By the early 1930's spectator shoes were clearly the style for men and boots were on their way out.

Handbags were much the same in the late 1920's and early 1930's. Beaded bags were prevalent as were enameled mesh bags and Art Deco design bags.

The most popular hats of the late 1920's were cloche hats. The early 1930's saw the cloche hat being replaced by hats with brims and berets. In the early 1930's it was common to see hats worn at an angle.

Coco Channel influenced the 1920's by using inexpensive jewelry and scarves to appeal to practical American women. Art Deco had its heyday during the late 1920's and early 1930's. The central theme of Art Deco was geometry and symmetry. Probably the most popular jewelry piece of the era was the pearl necklace. Another popular item was the double-clip brooch. Two identical clips would be attached together and worn as a single brooch. More often they were worn separately on the lapels of a dress belt.

The Model A era was a time of change not only for fashion but for life in general, from prosperity to depression in a span of a few years.


