

Depression Thanksgiving Pies

While Depression-era meals may not have included some of the ritzy and glitzy items that people in better-off economic times enjoyed, that's not to say that they weren't still tasty. In fact, there's one dessert recipe from this time period that actually surprisingly deli-



cious - Water Pie. I know, it sounds a little ridiculous, but the pie is made precisely as it sound. It uses water as the prime ingredient.

The era forced home cooks to get creative, using whatever they could to make comforting meals for the family. Commodities like sugar, eggs, and milk were challenging to obtain or too costly. Thus, many families had to make do by getting maximum mile-age from the foods they already had in their pantry, fridge, and freezer. The water pie was a recipe born from this circumstance.

The pie is incredibly simple and involves using a pie dough, sugar, cubes of butter, some flour, vanilla extract,

and water. The pie filling becomes custard-like after baking, similar to the scrumptious fillings of traditional pies!

Another Depression pie can be made with Ritz crackers, becoming a Mock Apple Pie. This pie is made by using crushed-up Ritz crackers with sugar and other ingredients and

seasonings as the pie base.

The result is a flaky pie with a delicious filling that oddly resembles the same consistency and flavor as actual apple pie. To this day, the mock apple



pie is still one of Ritz's famous recipes. The pie is a perfect staple for any household. But, even by today's standards, it can be a cheap alternative (even by today's standards) to grace the kitchen table.



MAFCA History

The club traces its origins to October 1955, when a small group of Model A Ford enthusiasts from the Los Angeles area came together to form a social club for Model A owners in Southern California. Initially named the **Model A Restorers Club of Southern California**, its activities were focused on the Los Angeles region.

On September 23, 1957, the club was officially founded as the **Model A Ford Club of America** (MAFCA) in Glendale, California, and was incorporated on October 21, 1957.

The launch of its publication, The Restorer, in May 1956 helped the club gain nationwide recognition. As the magazine grew in popularity, the club expanded beyond Southern California and took on a national presence. In 1957, it was reorganized and renamed, allowing other Model A clubs to join as affiliated chapters. Since then, **MAFCA** has chartered over 250 chapters across the United States and internationally.

Today, the **MAFCA** is the world's largest car club dedicated to a single automobile make. As a nonprofit organization, **MAFCA** is committed to the restoration and preservation of the Model A Ford. Membership is open to anyone with a genuine interest in these objectives and who meets the qualifications outlined in the club's By-Laws.

Early Paint of Model T and Model A Fords

Henry Ford used lacquer paint for the early Model T but switched to a quicker-drying, oven-baked enamel for a short period, starting around 1914.

He returned to using lacquer in 1926, when he switched to a faster-drying, nitrocellulose-based pyroxylin lacquer, allowing for different colors after the all-black era ended.

Early use: Before switching to the all-black, massproduced method, early cars were painted with lacquer, which required up to 20 coats and took a month to complete.





The black-only era: Around 1914, Ford switched to an oven-baked "Japan Black" enamel that dried in about an hour, reducing the painting time to around four hours.

This was possible because the high heat of the oven would alter the pigments of other colors, leaving only black and very dark hues available.

The return to color: When Ford introduced a new model in 1926 and moved away from the single all-black color, he transitioned to a new type of lacquer called pyroxylin lacquer, which allowed for a wider range of colors.

How to Cure Backfiring & Overheating



(From the Tulsa, Oklahoma Chapter MAFCA)

How to Cure Backfiring

Back firing is usually caused by the condenser failing, or the points may not have sufficient gap. Make sure they are set at .018 to .020". Make sure they are not burnt.

Backfiring can be caused by intermittent firing of the ignition system or very lean fuel mixture. If the car has been setting for a while, the carburetor float valve may be sticking. Clean the float valve good and set the float level. Backfiring due to intermittent ignition can be caused by a frayed wire on the bottom side of the distributor plate . . or .. by intermittent connection of the ignition switch.

Potential Solutions:

Check point setting first.

Replace condenser next (unless you are using modern points). Make sure the condenser you buy is the right length, some are too short. Make sure that it is good quality.

Check that the carburetor float valve is operating correctly.

Sometimes the pop out type ignition switches get intermittent. As a last resort, replace the ignition switch/cable.

Check the GAV to make sure it is not set too lean

How to Deal with Model A Overheating

There are several things that can cause a Model A to overheat. The main cause is usually the radiator. First you can check to see if your radiator has 3 rows of tubes. Some of the older replacement radiators had only 2 rows. That will not provide sufficient cooling. If the radiator is old and has been in the car a long time, the fins of the radiator become loose and cannot dissipate the heat. Also, if the radiator is old calcium deposits in the radiator will reduce the cooling efficiency of the radiator.

Like many Model A owners we had to replace a radiator as once we got the car over 40 MPH it would get hot. The radiator had 3 tubes but only 6 fins per inch (normal) plus the flow rate was quite slow. The new core that was put on has 12 fins per inch plus they are crinkled to provide maximum cooling surface area. Replacing the radiator along with slowing the rate of flow (installed a Thermostat) stopped the overheating on our "A".

Other potential causes of overheating: First make sure the timing is set correctly. Then make sure nothing is blocking the front of the radiator, like a license plate. If you have a new engine, it will sometimes run hot until it is broken in. There are several books and articles that have been written that will tell how to correctly set the timing. A blown head gasket can also cause overheating. Check for bubbles in the water at the filler neck. This may indicate a blown head gasket. Running your car too lean (Gas Adjustment Valve, GAV) can also contribute to your motor running hot. In hot weather there can be many contributing factors.





The International Order of the Rubber Chicken

The International Order of the Rubber Chicken Rules, Regulations and Other Silly Stuff
