



Yarrambat Heritage Museum Open Day 2023



YARRAMBAT - probably only the locals know where it is. Located just 24km from Melbourne's CBD and close to Whittlesea, the undulating countryside offers views of the Plenty Valley to the west and the Whittlesea Ranges to the north.

Prominent as a gold mining area in the late 1800's, farming became the mainstay after the gold ran out. Now, the farms are being subdivided into hectare lots and large homes are being built.



Hopefully in 2024, we can make a real day of it and provide more people and cars.



The Yarrambat Heritage Museum is by far the largest project undertaken by the Society. The Society took over the site in early 2001 and over the ensuing years has developed the site into an operational Heritage Museum.

A grant from the Victorian State Government enabled the relocation of the original 1878 Primary School classroom to the site in 2002. The Golden King Mine Battery was dismantled and rebuilt on site in 2002. Around this time a security fence, funded by the Nillumbik Shire Council, was erected around the Site.

Restoration of the Len Young Woolshed was carried out during 2005-6. Work on all four buildings on site is ongoing.

Meeting Notes of the AOMC Delegates Meeting Monday November 20th, 2023 at 7.30pm Venue: Austin Healey/Jaguar Clubrooms

There were 87 attendees representing 67 clubs and 1 visitor (Guest Speaker).

Chair: Keith Mortimer, President AOMC

Minutes of the August meeting were accepted on a motion moved Daryl Meek (Goldfields CC), seconded Damian O'Doherty (Vintage & Classic CC Ballarat) and carried.

Presidents Report: American Motoring Show held yesterday was a good day with approx. 450 cars in attendance. A lot of work from AOMC committee, particularly lain & Maureen Ross, Howard Billing, Mark Fenton and Philip Johnstone. Reward for Keith was wandering around and seeing the young families in attendance.

VicRoads working party met via zoom last week, with Keith (AOMC), Neil Athorn (VicFed) and 3 VicRoads representatives. Issues raised were license plates, illegal CPS usage, renewal issues, conditions on permits and inconsistencies around M & H plates. Further meetings will be scheduled.

Coming AOMC Events:

* Festival of Motoring – Sunday 21 January 2024 at Cruden farm. Closing date for entries is December 15.

* Aussie Car Show – Sunday 4th February at Mornington Racecourse. Iain Ross encouraged the Australian make clubs to support this show.

* RACV British & European Motoring Show – Sunday 18th Feb at Yarra Glen Racecourse.

* Florence Thomson Tour – 26th to 28th April. Based around Traralgon and touring the Gippsland region.

* National Motoring Heritage Day – Sunday 19th May 2024. Looking to support various events around the state.

Treasurers Report. Mark Fenton, AOMC Treasurer, apologised that he did not have the quarterly report with him as he had concentrated on the annual report. He reported that several clubs are yet to renew subscription.

AMHF Survey. Has been completed with around 6,000 respondents. Data is being processed.

Engine number records. Philip Johnstone reported that demand continues with various makes being submitted, including Toranas, Monaro, EH Holden, Ford Gt, Falcon, Land Rover and 5 Lancias.

Delegates reports / General business:

Peter Paproth (FX-FJ CC) – Noted that the state titles were held recently in Ballarat, and it was pleasing to see the next generation of young kids coming into the movement. Director of the event was a young woman in her 20s.

Rick Cove (EGHVC) – Rick noted that he attended the Ballarat Delegates meeting via zoom, and although he could hear everything, he was not able to make a comment. Similar thing happened with the taxation seminar.

Ian Clarke (Dandenong Valley CC) - Reported that the 50th anniversary Berwick Swap will take place on February 3rd 2023. Also, the club is revising the Australia Day Car Show with an event being held in Dandenong on Friday January 26th.

Guest Speaker: Scott Watson – Variety Around Victoria. Scott is the events manager for Variety running the "Variety Bash" and "Rally Around Victoria". Variety's main car event is the Bash, but not many people know what happens with the money raised. It helps kids with illness, disability and their families reach their potential. Since the NDIS started, they have aimed at covering those who are not covered by NDIS.

In 2022, \$13.3 million was granted impacting 152,312 kids. 2023 saw a 48% increase in requests for support.

Rally Around Victoria is a 3 year old event that started during covid, as drivers were unable to leave Victoria. It is a 3 day event open to all vehicles and is mainly tarmac based with some small dirt sections. This year's event starts at Cruden Farm and travels to Waratah Bay, Raymond Island, Bairnsdale, Walhalla, Marysville, Healesville and to Berwick for the finish.

It is limited to 60 vehicles because of the size of the towns they are visiting and staying at.

Keith Mortimer thanked Scott for his presentation and announced a short break for supper at 8.05pm.

Meeting Notes of the AOMC Annual General Meeting

Monday November 20th, 2023 at 8.30pm

Venue: Austin Healey/Jaguar Clubrooms

Treasurers Report: Mark Fenton presented the annual financial report for 2022/23 financial year. Accounting systems and support have been improved, financial standing is good and accounts have been independently reviewed. Total equity as at June 30, 2023 is \$255,728 leaving the AOMC in a steady financial position.

The accounts show a \$7,846 loss for the year, mainly due to the timing of event transactions.

There have been questions about the healthy bank balance of the AOMC. Mark pointed out that some of these funds are held in trust for the RACV for grants to small clubs also, there are liabilities for upcoming events.

A healthy bank balance also enables the AOMC to invest in programs such as the recent AHMF survey, and we are also ready to underwrite a group insurance scheme for clubs.

Shows and events have been good fundraisers in the past, but this has been challenging of late. The great work of Philip Johnstone with the Engine Number Records service has again raised over \$9,000 for the year.

Fees have remained stable, even though they are not covering the day to day running of the organisation, and Mark proposes no change to the fees for the 2024/25 financial year.

The financial benefit to the community from the movement is being measured by AOMC, and clubs are encouraged to provide data re charitable activities that can be put together as general movement contributions.

Notices of Motion:

It was moved Mark Fenton (AOMC, Chrysler Restorers Club), seconded Bill Ballard (F.O.R.D) that the 2022/23 annual financial report be accepted. Motion carried.

It was moved Mark Fenton, seconded Peter Welten (Triumph CC) that the fees for 2024/25 remain unchanged. Motion carried.

Presidents Report: This past year the committee started to look at its purpose. It has come up with the following: **"To support and protect the interests of motoring enthusiasts and our member clubs."**

The committee has also formed five priority areas,

each with a team leader and a sub committee. These are: **Member Services** – Club advice, Engine Number Records, seminars.

Events & Community Engagement – Events, Shows, Community benefit.

Communication & Enablement – website, social media, newsletter, delegates meetings.

Policy & Research - policy statements.

External Engagement – VicRoads, Dept of Transport, Politicians, Vic Fed, ASRF, Motorsport Australia, RACV, and any other organisation we need to deal with.

Keith then introduced Geoff Hergt (Jaguar CC) to chair the election of office bearers and committee. All position were declared vacant and nominations called for.

Secretary – Tony Hall (Escape Motoring) was the only nomination and was duly elected. **Treasurer** – Mark Fenton (Chrysler Restorers) was the only nomination and was duly elected. **Vice President** – lain Ross (Bristol Owners Club) was the only nomination and was duly elected. **President** – Keith Mortimer (Jaguar CC) was the only nomination and was duly elected.

It was moved Daryl Meek (Veteran CC) seconded Peter Welten (Triumph CC) that the number of Ordinary committee members be 8. Motion was carried.

There were 5 nominations for committee positions being: Lawrence Glynn (BMW Drivers), Philip Johnstone (TSOA), Peter Matthews (Classic Motorcycle Club), Robbie Mihelcic (Vic Torana Club), and Ken Goodin (Vict. Torana Club). There being no further nominations those 5 nominees were duly elected to committee for 2023/24 year.

Keith Mortimer announced the meeting closed at 9.06pm.

THE TALE of the F... Screw

(Which is of course, short for the Focusing -screw)

My 1930 Model A "the old girl" was blowing fuses so my immediate thought was, "Ah,we have a short somewhere".

Now using only Ford parts (thanks Dave O'Neill) I did the following...

Added an extra earth strap from the battery to ground Rewired from the generator to the starter motor

Rewired from the starter motor to the bulk head

Fitted a new bulkhead terminal box, coil and ammeter

Rewired the wiper motor

AND STILL THE FUSE BLEW

So.... I rewired the lights - again with a Ford wiring loom

Fitted new bulb holders to each light

Added earths to the lights

The light wiring loom included new wiring for horn - and

for the hell of it I fitted a brand new horn also

Before the final assembly of the lights it was – ignition on, ready, car running well and all lights working correctly -Fuse not blown- Great!

Next....

I reassembled the lights And

BANG! AGAIN THE FUSE BLEW!!

It was then and only then I realised that everything I had previously done was completely unnecessary.

The issue was the F-ing screw, I had been screwing the focusing screw in too far on the headlight so it was making contact with the bulb holder causing a SHORT How I laughed (NOT)

I did however escape from washing the dishes of quite a few evenings and learnt a little bit more about what makes "the old girl" tick.

Our resident Sparky adds: "Yes, the focussing screw can easily short things. It's an extremely poor design. The picture printed here is from the original service sheets and shows the early headlamp which has no parking light. If you have the later Duolamp type which has an additional 5w watt parking light, here's a tip.... the parking light goes at 12 o'clock, not 6 o'clock– for years I had my reflectors on upside down! I have been told that the modern reproduction reflectors do not have the correct parabola contours so are impossible to correctly focus... well, that's my excuse anyway!"

Headlamps

⁴Align and focus the headlamps with the empty car standing on a lever surface in front of a white wall or screen 25 feet from the front of the headlamps. This wall must be in semi-

darkness, or sufficiently shielded from direct light for the Lens light spots from the headlamps to be clearly seen. The wall must be Bulb marked off with black lines as shownin Figs. 274 and 275. Details for making the Door. layout are given in Fig. 276.

Focussing

Door latch

Turn the headlamps on "bright" but keep one lamp covered while focussing the other. Adjust the bulb filament to the focal centre of the reflector by means of the screw at the back of the lamp, so that an elongated elliptical spot of light, with its long axis horizontal, is obtained on the wall (see Fig. 274). The bulb should be adjusted to obtain as good a contrast and as well-defined cut-off across the top of the spot of light as possible.

Editor's Notes

- 1. The Duolamp light referred to is a tail light. The headlight with a parking light bulb is called Twolight

Steering Boxes, Gearboxes and Differentials - just what is 600W oil? By Paul Hunter North Island Model A Ford Club

600W Oil was used in Model A transmissions. differentials and steering boxes when they were first manufactured. It was the oil weight of Henry's choice and it must have done its job as so many Model As have survived till today. With change in the industry, and with little in the way of a technical specification for the 600W oil and that Henry changed specifications as he developed newer cars, the original 600W oil became harder to find resulting in many car owners using any oil they could find. With these newer oils, people did often notice the puddles underneath their cars but they thought was normal for a Model A. The saying went "If it wasn't leaking it must be empty."

It is a mystery how or why the term "600W" became synonymous with Model A steeringgearbox differential lubrication. The only reference to "600" or "600W" that can be found in Model A Ford literature is on page 377 of the Service Bulletin where they are discussing the seven tooth steering system. On page 375 of the Service Bulletin they recommend M-533 lubricant for the transmission and differential whereas on page 216 Ford recommend simply "gear lubricant."

A's started As Model to go through restoration, it became apparent that the wrong grade of oil was being used. Transmissions and rear differentials were using 90 weight. People were putting grease in the steering boxes. These oils and greases were used in more modern cars. It was assumed new oils meant they were better. There are a number of people and books that have tricks for matching the original type of oil. This includes STP oil treatment with a supplier's version of 600W. Some also warn against these tricks. If you ask other Model A enthusiasts you will get even more suggestions.

Quote "I would prefer using known viscosity oil rather than an oil about which I know nothing. Rather than buy an unknown, I would recommend a quality high pressure gear lubricant for the Model A steeringtransmission-differential such as SAE 250 or SAE 140 in that order. SAE 80W-90 is a little thin for quiet shifting and you will probably hear more transmission and differential noise than with 250 or 140.

Some companies are packaging an 85W-140 oil which is a little thin for our purpose". -- Lyle Meek, Technical Director MAFCA.

Everything I've found indicates 600W was mineral based gear oil, early Model T data talks about 600W Steam Cylinder Oil, which research showed having a viscosity of ISO600/ 680.

ISO 320 is equivalent to SAE 85W140, ISO 460 is equivalent to SAE 140, ISO 680-1000 is equivalent to SAE 250.

The following are the ISO 600/680 equivalents available in New Zealand: Mobil: Mobilgear 600 XP 680 BP: Energol GR-XP 680 Fuchs: Renolin CLP Gear Oil 680

Model A Ford Capacities:

Gearbox & Differential add just enough fluid to the differential to bring the level to just below the opening. A good gauge is to insert your little finger to the first joint and it should have fluid on it when removed.

The same goes for the transmission. Remove the filler plug on the side and fill with fluid until it comes up to just below the opening. There is a wealth of information waiting out there. All we have to do is Google it and have plenty of spare time surfing the Internet.

*Disclaimer:

The above is written following research via the Internet and the information presented is the author's opinion. He would encourage readers to ensure that they undertake confirmation of the above, if changing from their oil/s currently used.

Will I (Paul) be changing - yes, the technical arguments are in favour of the heavier oil. What have I got to lose? Apart from some time and money - nothing.

I believe that it is a well worthwhile exercise. We (MAFCVNZ) have club members using oil weights from SAE 85-SAE250, with everyone having their beliefs about the performance of their oil weight choice. Talk to you fellow club members for their thoughts and views.

Tiny Tip - Keeping Moisture Out of the Distributor



Have you ever driven your Model A in the rain, and have it "act up?" This is exactly what happened to me while on tour with the Western Carolina's Model A Club. First the car began to periodically "skip." Then it began to really run rough, until it just died! The cause - moisture in the distributor. Well, this is a common problem in cars without electronic ignitions.

Usually, the humidity level in the atmosphere is something the hot engine "burns" off before coming in contact with our distributors. But, when it rains, there is just too much moisture in the atmosphere and the inside of the distributor cap will begin to "sweat." This in turn causes moisture droplets to fall onto the points, thus interrupting the flow of electricity between the ignition coil and the spark plugs. Generally, if you can get the distributor dry, you can go on your merry way. But how to solve the problem before it happens is the real question. Nobody wants to try to stand in a downpour over a hot engine and try to dry out their distributor!

WD-40 is the answer! It was developed in 1953 by Norm Larson, founder of the Rocket Chemical Company, in San Diego, CA. WD-40, from the abbreviation "Water Displacement, 40th formula," was originally designed to repel water and prevent corrosion. Another little "tool" to keep in your arsenal!

If every 3-4 months you will open up your distributor and spray the underside of the cap and down into the distributor and the tops of the spark plugs and the plug "wires," a rain shower will never leave you sitting by the side of the road waiting on AAA! ~Happy Begg, Palmetto A's of South Carolina

THE MODEL A TOOL BOX

COTTER PINS (Split Pins in Oz)

By Colin Lawson - Canada Capital A's

There are approximately 163 cotter pins used in the Model A. This was an easy way to secure fasteners and prevented nuts from becoming loose. It was also a preferred method where items were frequently disassembled for servicing. It is important that replacement pins be installed in the correct way. Our member Dave Welch, being a former heavy equipment owner/operator, declares only to use new cotter pins for replacement to save your life.

While doing a wheel alignment check on a member's car a glaring problem was evident. The engine mounting plate on one side was loose and on its way to falling off. Two nuts were missing, one bolt was captured by the rubber mount and the other bolt was sheared off. All because no cotter pins were installed on both mount plates when the float-a-motor kits was added. Also note in the picture that one securing bolt of the side mount spare bracket is missing or was never installed. The engine mount was removed and original bolts and nuts were installed with new cotter pins on both sides.

When a Float-A-Motor kit is installed, the nuts go in farther on the bolts since the inner rubber pad is removed. Flat washers should be installed under the nuts to ensure the pin hole is closer to alignment with nut grooves so the cotter pin grabs properly. The nuts should be suitably torqued to secure the mounts. The original bolts are 5/16 x 24 so a typical torque is 20 ft-lbs.





FIGURE 7-6. Securing with cotter pins.







FIGURE 7-7. Alternate method for securing with cotter pins.

For locations such as clevis pins and shock links the cotter pin is placed as shown in Figure 7-7. Alternative "tuck" method to bury the ends as used in parasail and some aviation equipment, but the pin head is not secured in the castellation.





Information from FAA advisory circular (AC 43.13-1B):

- Cotter pins are used to secure such items as bolts, screws, pins, and shafts. Their use is favored because they can be removed and installed quickly.
- The diameter of the cotter pins selected for any application should be the largest size that will fit consistent with the diameter
 of the cotter pin hole and/or the slots in the nut.
- Cotter pins should not be reused (on aircraft).
- A finished cotter pin installation should be tight. Loose installations can cause premature wear and failure.
- When using the method of cotter pin installation as shown in figures 7-6 and 7-7, ensure the prong, bent over the bolt, is seated firmly against the bolt shank, and does not exceed bolt diameter. Also, when the prong is bent over the nut, ensure the bent prong is down and firmly flat against the nut and does not contact the surface of the washer.

Maybe amusing, but first thing I noticed was that most cotter pins were replaced with either 4d or 6d nails. During this period, (with Cokes & candy bars selling for 5 cents), lots of local Model A's, as I remember during these times, were owned by families who were so poor that they made their own boxer shorts from scratch with multi-colour flour sacks & buttons because they could not afford to buy the more expensive elastic type Hanes Underwear.

An observation from Mr Chavin on FordBarn: When I bought my 1930 Coupe in 1958 for \$25.00, there were 3 or 4 other Model A's parked on the side of our rural gravel roads in the \$60.00 range.
