I missed the September meeting because Linda and I were at the 68th Annual New England Model A Meet in Boxborough, Massachusetts. The New England meets have become almost "can't miss" events for us. We enjoy exploring locations we might not otherwise visit and spending a

long weekend with fellow hobbyists from around the region. So far we have driven a Model A to all the New England meets we've attended, although trailering is always an option. Planning a route along back roads, then following that route is an integral and fun part of the adventure for us.

This year the meet was hosted by the Minuteman Model A Ford Club with the theme, "A Scenic Drive in '25". They did a fantastic job! There were a total of 156 registrations, or about 280 people. They represented 17 clubs from the New England states, New York and New Jersey. The meet also attracted folks from as far away as Virginia and Pennsylvania. The Grand Tour on Saturday included 120 Model A's representing almost every body style. The tour really was a scenic drive around the Wachusett Reservoir, one of the oldest reservoirs developed as a source for public drinking water in the country. The tour ended in Lancaster, Massachusetts at Kimball's Grill and Ice Cream where peer judging took place.

Several cars belonging to Pine Tree members won awards in their classes. Mike Brauch's 1930 Town Sedan won first place in the 1930 closed class. The car was his father's and Mike has lovingly restored it. Don Urbanik's 1931 Coupe won second place in the 1931 Closed class (the 1930-31 Closed class is always the largest so this year it was split).

Christine MacKenzie's 1930 Deluxe Roadster won third in the 1930-31 Open class. A number of cars belonging to "Friends of the Pine Tree Club" also garnered awards. Luis Leite's 1929 Town Car (yes, Town Car, not Town Sedan) won first place in the 1928-29 closed car class. Newton Wells' 1928 Phaeton won first in the 1928-29 Open class. Mike Brauch restored that car a few years ago. Newt is a professional DJ and provided the entertainment on Friday night. He had lots of folks on the dance floor!

Speaking of entertainment, Saturday night featured an early Beatles cover band that was excellent. Other traditional aspects of the New England meet were also excellent, including the raffle room, Hubley races, and self-guided tours for those who arrive early. Many of us went to the Minute Man National Historical Park, which includes the route between Lexington and Concord and Old North Bridge, where the American Revolution began 250 years ago.

Next year the New England Meet will be hosted by the Worcester County Model A Club, September 17-20 at the historic Wellsworth Hotel in Southbridge, Massachusetts. It is not too early to book your hotel room, we have!

I decided to restore it and it took about 6 years. I put it on the road after a complete restoration in 2003 and drove it to the MARC National Meet in Dearborn, MI. That was my goal to complete the restoration since 2003 was the 100th anniversary of Ford Motor Company. My dad went with mehe was 92. It is a 1931 Deluxe Coupe and currently has over 32,000 miles since restoration.



While you have it off, also inspect the inside of the oil filler cap. It, too, needs to be clear inside. No pieces of steel wool, pot scrubber, or old sock in the cap! Look for evidence of someone accidentally pushing the oil filler cap on too far. When you do, you bend the little tabs inside the cap and mash it all the way down on the pipe. This blocks the engine's ability to vent the crankcase, builds up pressure, and causes a bad leak out the rear main seal.

I hope this little tip helps you stop that oil leak while driving. Have a Model A Day!

Ignition Coil trouble shooting

First, what is an ignition coil? Your Ford A ignition coil is part of the ignition system. The ignition coil "converts" the voltage in the system from the 6 volts on your battery to approximately 24,000 volts. When you turn the ignition key, the ignition coil sends 24,000 volts of high voltage to the distributor which in turn sends it to the spark plugs which create a spark that ignites compressed gasoline vapor in the combustion chamber and, if your distributor is properly adjusted, starts the engine.

If your engine is having trouble starting, or is running poorly, a bad ignition coil is a possible cause of the problem.

How do you test your ignition coil? With the ignition off, you can use a "multitester" and its ohms function to check the resistance across the coil terminals. (poles) Connect a test lead? on your multi-tester to each of the terminals and read the resistance. On a 6V coil, you should read between 1.43 and 1.58 ohms of resistance. If you read zero resistance, you have a short in the coil and it is not working. If you read infinite resistance, there is a break in the windings and the coil is not working and needs to be replaced. Replace with a new approved unit. Take a new ignition coil with you when you are on a long trip, because if the ignition coil breaks on the trip, it won't help to have a new one on a shelf at home in your garage.


