

## **Presidents Message**

September 22, 2025

Fluid pumps can be a maintenance headache on many types of machinery ranging from rail-road locomotives to marine engines and to Model A Fords. Fortunately, Model As do not have fuel pumps so that leaves only the water pump.

One of my Model As does not have the "leakless" water pump, so in due course the stock water pump started to leak coolant. A tweak on the packing nut solved the problem for a while but eventually the packing was so far gone that simply tightening the packing nut would not solve the problem.

There is some material in Les Andrews' red book on how to service the packing and a discussion on the subject is contained on pages 148 and 149 of the Model A Service Bulletins Complete from Lincoln Publishing Company. Fortunately, Sammy at Arizona Model As sells the "metallic split ring packing" as it is called. He also sells a spanner to turn the packing nut on and off the pump body. If this is not available, a screw driver or open end wrench will work.

It is possible to change out the packing without removing the water pump from the car. First you have to drain the coolant down below the level of the pump. However, it is necessary to remove all the flattened and crushed pieces of the old packing before proceeding further. Auto parts stores sell gasket pics which can be used for this. In my case, one hobby complimenting another, I used old dental pics scrounged from the dentist to work on model trains.

The new packing comes with directions on how to fit to the pump shaft and then it simply a matter of threading the packing nut back onto the front of the pump housing and drawing it up tight enough to prevent leaks. Lubrication is the key to success so grease the pump occasionally.

#### In the Model A Era : At the Movies

The Jazz Singer was released in October 1927 (before you say, "hold on! The first Model A didn't come out until 1928!", well, Henry's Lady was actually introduced just a few weeks after this movie, on October 20, 1927. And since this first feature length talkie was still in theatres when the New Ford Car first hit the streets, we felt it was appropriate.

The Jazz Singer marked the end for the silent film. While a part talkie, part silent film, it was indeed Hollywood's first full length movie to feature synchronized moving pictures and sound.


The first vocal performance in The Jazz Singer, by Al Jolson playing Jack Robin, begins at the 17:25 mark of the fil, and include the spoken words, "Wait an minute, wait a minute, you ain't heard nothin' yet!" which was a well established stage patter of Jolsen. It also features him singing "Dirt Hands, Dirty Face" among other tunes.

The Jazz singer was a high budget film, costing not quite double Warner Brothers typical cost of \$250,000 at the time, but it was also a very large success, becoming one of the top 3 highest grossing movies on 1927 and winning an Honorary Academy Award for Warner Brothers.



#### In The Model A Era

In the 1920s and 30s, Halloween evolved from a holiday focused on mischief and outright vandalism, including pranks, property damage, and fights, to a more commercialized and family friendly tradition similar to what we know today (although if we are being honest, the former has not, unfortunately been completely eliminated). The destructiveness of these incidents lead some communities to consider banning the holiday. Many communities responded by organizing festivals, parties and parades, and promoting trick or treating as a safe alternative for children to receive treats without causing trouble. Commercial haunted houses were developed as another way to introduce safe fun. The 1920s saw the emergence of paper costumes that were mass produced, such as clowns, witches and flappers, but by the 1930s boxed costumes featuring plastic masks and modeled after popular characters of the day emerged (Mickey Mouse, Popeye, and Little Orphan Annie) were popular. Horror movies of the day also had an influence on costumes. The 1920s and 30s marked a turning point for Halloween in the USA, moving away from a holiday of widespread destruction to one that became quite similar to what we have today.
