

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# **DRIVER'S SEAT**

Regarding traditions associated with this time of year, I read an online article recently about *MotorTrend* magazine's "Car of the Year." *MotorTrend*'s first issue was September 1949 and its first Car of the Year was Cadillac. Ford was considered because of its first post-war offering with all new chassis and body but was rejected because "...all their changes simply brought them up to date with other brands...." While that may be true, the 1949 models have been credited with saving Ford Motor Company. For its inaugural award MotorTrend chose Cadillac (who had introduced its post-war design in 1948) because of its all new OHV V8 engine. Interestingly, that engine benefited from higher octane fuels that had been developed for aviation use during World War II.

In the early years *MotorTrend* awarded manufacturers or divisions, not specific vehicles. There were a few years when no award was given; i.e., 1950, 53, and 54. Between 1976 and 1999 there were two Car of the Year awards, one for domestic and one for imported. The award was expanded to include "Truck of the Year" in 1979 and "SUV of the Year" in 1999. To be eligible for one of the awards, a vehicle must be "all new" or "substantially upgraded." For 2026, Car of the Year is the Volkswagen Golf GTI/R and the SUV of the Year is the Cadillac Escalade IQ, while the 'Truck of the Year" has not been announced yet.

The complete list of winners can be found online. A Ford has been Car of the Year 12 times while a Chevrolet has won the award 16 times. In 1964 the award went to Ford Motor Company but it isn't clear what impact the new Mustang had on that decision. When it comes to Truck of the Year, Ford has won it 10 times, Chevrolet 11 times and Dodge/Ram 8 times. Over the years Linda and and I have had over 20 cars, pickups, vans, and SUVs between us. Of all those vehicles only one made any of the MotorTread lists and that was our 1971 Chevrolet Vega, probably the vehicle we kept the shortest amount of time!

Many people are skeptical of awards from magazines that depend heavily on advertising and probably for good reason. Nevertheless, MotorTrend has been doing it for so long its awards are still coveted by manufacturers and interesting for us gear heads to follow. *Consumer Reports* might provide the most unbiased rankings but I often find the cars they recommend to be rather boring. To each their own.

I do hope to see you at our Christmas party on the 13th. Hopefully the weather will cooperate and we will have a good turnout.



# During the Great Depression, money was tight and people had to scrimp on many things, including food.

I have included two Depression era recipes for peanut butter cookies and Salmon Cuke Salad.

#### DEPRESSION ERA RECIPE

#### **Peanut Butter Cookies**

1 c. sugar

1 c. brown sugar

½ c. butter

½ cup lard

2 eggs

2 T. baking soda

¾ c. peanut butter

1 t. vanilla

2 c. flour

Cream sugars and fats until fluffy. Add eggs and beat well. Add baking soda, peanut butter, and vanilla. Stir in Flour. Roll with hands into balls. Place on a greased cookie tin. Bake in a 375-degree oven for about 10-15 minutes. Flatten with a fork before baking.

### SALMON CUKE SALAD

Depression Era Recipes, by Patricia R. Wagner

1 head of lettuce 2 cucumbers, sliced 1 onion, minced Salt & pepper 1 c. salmon, shredded Boiled dressing Break apart the lettuce, wash and dry the leaves, and place on salad plates. Put on cucumber slices, minced onion, salt, and pepper. Beat together the salmon and boiled dressing. Pour over vegetables.

#### FORD'S ENTRY INTO THE FIELD IS A DRAMATIC ONE

The new Ford car, for months the greatest mystery of the commercial world, made a dramatic appearance before the world today and was accorded such a reception as has rarely been achieved by the most adept press agency. From all parts of the United States and from abroad came reports of the impatient thousands standing in line for a chance to see the successor to the flivver, the trim, conventionally designed car which replaces the familiar if ungainly machine so dear to the cartoonist and the jokesmith.

They saw a car with some individualities, yet not essentially different in general appearance from a dozen others. From the driver's viewpoint, as from the spectator's, it seemed similar in many ways to other cars. Great power and speed, economy and long service were promised for it by Ford representatives.

In New York, night owls searched out the show rooms at 3 a.m. to see the new model, and thousands upon thousands jammed past the show places after daylight came. A steady rain did not discourage the curious. In Chicago less wild enthusiasm but great interest was shown. A line stretched a block from the main show room on State Street by noon and uncounted thousands had been shoved through the display room.

Police called out! Mounted police were called out in Cleveland to protect windows from the crowds. In Detroit forty of the new cars were displayed in the convention hall while music from two bands entertained the crowd.

Special trains carried observers from all parts of the British Isles to London where the new models were on display at Holland Park Hall. Newspapers made the display of the new car their principal story and British motor manufacturers were quoted as predicting a bitter fight to hold the market.

The new car distracted Washington's attention momentarily from politics and from 7 a.m. prospective buyers and would-be buyers streamed past the display.

In Oklahoma City, business men, farmers and housewives jammed the street in front of the display room.

In Indianapolis 2,000 persons saw the car at the fair grounds in the first three hours it was on display. Six thousand saw the Ford in St. Paul before 11 a.m. and exhibitors expected 25,000 before night despite sub-zero weather. \*END\*

# Era Fashions: Christmas in 1928 - 1931

A kid during the Great Depression was happy to get a single orange in a Christmas stocking, as oranges weren't affordable during the rest of the year. Other treats in stockings were bananas, nuts and candy. If the kids were really fortunate there may have been a toy such as a doll or a toy wagon.

Most gifts were either homemade or homegrown. Mothers and grandmothers made dresses and aprons for girls from flour sacks that were imprinted with designs. Boys got socks, maybe gloves, perhaps even a hand knitted scarf. There wasn't fluff and bling; the gifts were handcrafted for practical purposes. Christmas was about family and being grateful for what you did have. Many product ads and magazines featured colorful holiday illustrations. In fact, 1931 was the year that Coca-Cola introduced the rendition of Santa Claus as we know him today!
